puted, attributed much of Canada's sound financial position to Cliff Clark's "clear judgment and unswerving devotion to duty." Dr. Clark's physical stature tended toward the short side, but his mental stature was breath-taking. Though appointed in 1932 to the deputy ministry by a Conservative, the late Lord Bennett, he tended more toward the Liberal line in his thought.

Born on Farm

Of English-Scottish stock, Dr. Clark was born on a Marintown, Ont., farm in Eastern Ontario's Gengarry County, on April 18, 1889. The jovial young farm boy wanted to be an engineer. He went to Queen's but there the professors urged him to stick to economics. He ended up with a scholarship to Harvard University.

Pilot Receives Minor Injuries In Forced Landing

Yesterday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock a private Fleet Finch plane piloted by L.A.G. James Rae Franklyn of the R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside had a crash landing at the farm of Lloyd Afflick, Bedeque, near Bonness Pond. The cause of the crash is attributed to engine failure and the plane itself was badly damaged.

L.A.C. Franklyn was flying to Summerside from his hometown, Digby, N.S., when the crash occurred. He received severe facial lacerations and was taken to the Prince County Hospital for treatment and it was expected last night that he would be released today.

The R. C. A. F. ambulance was sent from the port, and breaking through extremely heavy drifts reached the scene with much difficulty. The ambulance was driven by Corporal Erikson D. F. C., who has had considerable experience in winter driving in northern climates and it was due to his ability that they were able to reach the scene of the crash and bring L.A.C.
