

**IMPORTED BEE
MAY AID WEST**

OTTAWA (CP)—A little imported bee living in an ordinary soda straw may put the Alberta hayseed industry back on its feet.

The insect is a top-flight pollinator of alfalfa blooms—spreading the pollen necessary for seed production, the federal agriculture department said.

It is called the alfalfa leaf-cutter bee, imported by chance into the United States several years ago and brought into southern Alberta last year for testing at the Lethbridge research station.

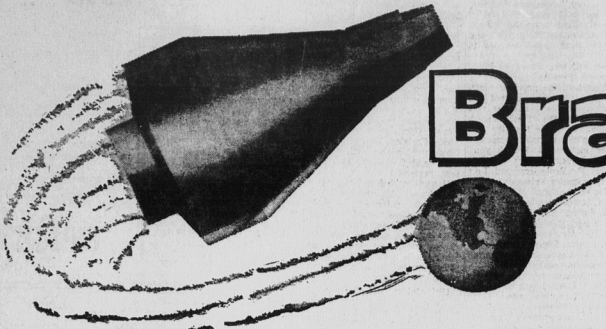
Scientists hope it will help regain the alfalfa seed market lost to the U.S. in recent years.

Researchers put the little bees in drinking straws 6-32nds and 7-32nds of an inch in diameter. Hundreds of the females stuffed the straws with cells containing food from alfalfa blossoms. Their normal nests are made of leaves cut from the same plant.

For the winter, the bees were put in man-made nests and stored at a temperature eight degrees above freezing.

More tests will be conducted to learn how the bee population can be increased in the West. The insects can be controlled so that new adults emerge just when the alfalfa blooms.
