 Early year business reports are less than sensational but they indicate continued advance.

Perhaps more interesting than the over-all reports are the many individual announcements that indicate that business is pursuing an aggressive course.

Canadian General Electric's announcement that it has obtained a \$5,000,000 order for electrical equipment from Ghana is only one example of many.

Continuing new investments by various interests also indicate faith in the future.

If developments continue in this fashion they will build up a force that somewhere along the line can be expected to make itself felt in a real economic surge.

The Canadian Association of Purchasing Agents in its February bulletin says moderate gains in new orders and production were reported in January, with prices, employment and inventories remaining at about the December level.

New orders were booked at the December level by 47 per cent of reporting companies, while 32 per cent reported increases and 20 per cent decreases.

RUBBER TO RISE

The Rubber Association of Canada says the rubber industry expects its consumption of rubber to rise to a near-record level this year.

Member companies, which account for about 90 per cent of

18-Orbit Flights Planned For Astronauts This Year

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James Webb, administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, said each flight would keep an astronaut in space for 27 hours.

The orbits would be made at satellite velocities of about 17,500 miles an hour.

Writing in Aerospace, official publication of the U.S. Aerospace Industries Association, Webb said the flights would test man's ability to live and work in the space environment.

Webb said that beyond the Mercury program, a major launch scheduled for 1962 would be OSO, the orbiting solar observatory.

The 440-pound OSO satellite, 37 inches tall, will be stabilized so instruments point continuously toward the sun. It will measure ultraviolet, gamma ray and x-ray regions of the spectrum.

Webb said that barring unforeseen delays 1962 also will see:

1. The first interplanetary probes with missions in the vicinity of Venus. Two 1,100-pound Mariner R spacecraft are designed to carry instruments to within 16,000 miles of Venus.
2. Launching of advanced weather satellites designed to provide information from every point of the earth every six hours.
3. The launching of advanced communications satellites that eventually will make global television a reality.

Ford Profits Show Decline

DETROIT (AP)—Ford Motor Co. Monday announced a 1961 profit of \$409,500,000, equal to \$7.45 a share. This compared with \$427,900,000, or \$7.80 a share in 1960.

Ford's record year was 1955 when it made \$545,200,000. Dollar sales were \$6,710,000,000 compared with \$6,790,000,000 in 1960.

Ford said its fourth-quarter net earnings were \$120,400,000 equal to \$2.19 a share and compared with \$111,700,000 or \$2.04 a share in the fourth quarter of 1960.

Net sales in the fourth quarter of 1961 were \$1,860,000,000. Ford said both net sales and net earnings were adversely affected in the last quarter of 1961 by a two-week strike which halted most of the company's domestic operations.

FARM IMPLEMENTS

Sales of Canadian farm implements and equipment in 1961, valued at \$236,594,000, were eight per cent lower than 1960.
