SPRING BIRD WATCHING

It is the early watcher that catches the bird, or, in other words, anybody really anxious to see birds and hear them at their best must rise before dawn. At no other period in the 24 hours do they sing with greater abandon. And now the date has come round again for the field trip to get our first glimpse of the returning songsters. As we strike the open air a chill goes through us, and presently we wish we had worn mitts. But before we have reached the first thicket, brightness fills the eastern sky, and the far sound of bird voices seems to warm our fingers as well as our hearts.

A Yellow-bellied Sapsucker's irregular tapping and a White-throated Sparrow's well-known song, "Sweet, sweet, Canada, Canada, Canada," flow to us from a distance. The cheerful voice of a Song Sparrow encourages us to push on, until we come upon a whole band of Ruby-crowned Kinglets. Their movement is so rapid that we see the top of a head with difficulty, but, for a second, a little fellow slows down in full view, and the tiny red hat rises like a puff ball in a damp meadow, as he pours out note after note in ringing tones. As we stand listening, the flute-like voice of a Hermit Thrush breaks in, and we are truly thrilled.

But what are those small birds in the very tops of the tallest trees? Our necks are strained as we strain field glasses on the flock. Weak little songs come from two dozen throats. Why, of course, we are in the company of Myrtle Warblers! Next we hear the loud voice of a Flicker. What a noisy bird! And what are these queer-looking little objects at the foot of a big pine tree? Somebody picks one up and reminds us that these are pellets that have been disgorged by an Owl which evidently spent some weeks living in the old tree.

"Conkerree." Red-winged Blackbirds have returned to the marshy ground where we found them last spring, and as we press on, we catch a glimpse of their shiny black, and the lovely scarlet and yellow epaulets.

As we approach clearer land, we are in hopes of discovering the Meadowlark to whose high-pitched whistle we have been listening. But first a surprise awaits us, for a Fox Sparrow's loud, clear carol brings us to a halt, and presently we spy the big, handsome bird with the red-brown tail. Our trip was worth while. Sometimes it pays to lose sleep.

Miss McCoubrey, the popular post mistress of the village, Mr. G. R. Williams was honored by the Brazilian Government, by being appointed a Knight of the Brazilian National Order of the Southern Cross. Mr. Williams was notified of this high honour on his return from a visit to the United Kingdom. The honour which has been conferred on this worthy gentleman, comes after nearly half a century of public service. In his early years he was clerk to the late A. O. Hayward, K. C., and subsequently Vice Consul from 1917 to 1921 when the late Mr. Fenlon was Consul. In 1921 the Brazilian Government opened a consulate here in charge of Senor Wenceslau de Souza Guimaraes who was later appointed to the consulate of Japan. He was succeeded by Senor Branbois in 1922. After Senor Branbois returned to Brazil the regular government consulate was closed and a Vice Consulate opened in charge of Mr. Williams who took office on March 30, 1934 and held the position to this date. His official permission to represent a foreign government was received from His Majesty King George Fifth in August, 1934. Mr. Williams has made an occasional visit to P. E. Island.
