Amendments Urged To Safeguard Fish Interests

HALIFAX, — The fishing industry yesterday urged the Federal government to take steps to end discrimination against Canadian fishing craft over 65 feet in length operating off the eastern Canadian coast. The appeal was one of nine major resolutions adopted on the final day of the 13th annual meeting of the Fisheries Council of Canada. The resolutions covered a wide variety of subjects vital to the industry from Newfoundland to British Columbia. The resolution on the 12-mile limit referred to the fact that for many years Canadian owned and operated fishing craft over 65 feet in length have been prohibited from fishing in the waters off the eastern Canadian coast which are open to foreign vessels. It said there is evidence of intensified fishing by these foreign-registered craft in these Canadian coastal waters and pointed out that continuation of the prohibition by the Government of Canada is discriminatory. The resolution requested the government to amend the regulations so as to allow its own nationals, "the same privileges presently enjoyed by fishing craft of foreign register".

Breaking, Entry And Theft Case Before Court In City

Two young city men will appear in Court this morning charged with break, entry and theft. Melvin Clarkin and George Hughes, both city residents appeared before Judge C. St. Clair Trainor yesterday. They are charged with the theft of 19 packages of assorted types of cigarettes and \$2.65 in pennies from Tom Davie's Red Indian Texaco Service station situated on the corner of Fitzroy and Great George Streets. The incident took place in the early hours of the morning of March 20th. Deputy Chief Sterns Webster, of the City Police appearing as a witness for the prosecution, told the court that he was called to the service station at about 12:45 a.m. on the morning of March 20. The two accused were arrested about a half hour later when Deputy Chief Webster and Constables Allen McLeod and Keith Wakelin accosted them in Art's Taxi stand on Queen Street.

When cross-examined by Crown prosecutor J. P. Nicholson, Hughes told nearly 15 minutes to admit to the court that, when he was offered the merchandise by the two unknown men, he had thought, then that "the goods were hot." The three police officers said that they had seen the two accused on Spring Park Road shortly after midnight on March 20th. One (Clarkin) had come across the street while the car was parked and asked if it was a taxi and then turned away when informed that it wasn't. SA W ACCUSED Deputy Chief Webster said that he was delivering a telegram out that way for the telegraph office when they saw the two, Hughes and Clarkin. However, this was prior to the report of the break at the

service station. Shortly after investigating the incident, the two boys were noticed by the patrol car as they sat in the taxi stand. When the officers walked in, neither made any attempt to escape and were taken to the police station where they spent the night. It was at the station that the two were searched and the packages of cigarettes and pennies were discovered. Clarkin is expected to take the witness stand this morning when the Court resumes at 10:30 a.m.

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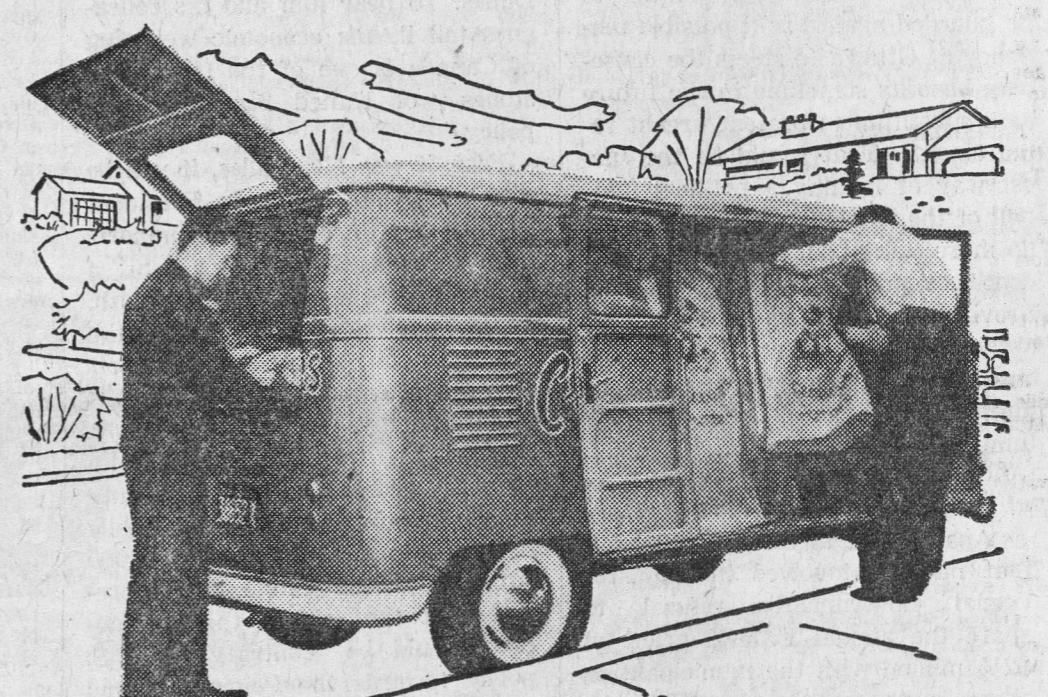
Workmen's Compensation Bd. Report Shows Surplus

While forecasting a deficit of \$8,727 for the calendar year 1957, a surplus of \$35,515 is shown for 1956 in a report tabled in the Legislature by the P.E.I. Workmen's Compensation Board. This surplus was \$11,000 greater than the surplus attained in 1955, and \$27,000 more than the 1954 figure, comparative figures indicate. In an appended statement, 1957 revenue is estimated at \$269,413 from all sources, with expenditure projected to total \$278,201 including accident claims: \$244,569; administrative expenses, \$31,071, and provision for uncollectable accounts, \$2,560. The Balance Sheet as at December 31, 1957 lists Board assets totalling \$626,519, with liabilities, amounting to \$354,957 indicating a 1957 Surplus in Capital Account of \$271,561, after allowing for the projected deficit of \$8,727. The pension fund reserve as at December 31, 1957, stood at \$288,612. 1,535 CLAIMS In 1956, the Board handled

1,535 claims, seven of which were fatal, 13 resulted in permanent partial disability, 663 resulted in temporary total disability. 786 required medical aid only; the remaining 79 being classified as non-compensable. Of these, the largest number occurred during the month of August, when 171 claims were filed. In the remaining eleven months claims were filed as follows: January, 92; February, 102; March, 95; April, 91; May 151; June, 154; July, 163; September, 138; October, 155; November, 131; and December, 92. In 1956 the largest number of claims originated in Queens County, residents of which filed 761 accident reports. From other districts the Board received applications for compensation as follows: Kings County, 217; Prince County, 495; and outside localities, 62. Disability in the majority of cases processed by the Board in 1956 terminated in less than eight weeks. But in several isolated cases disability continued from 22 to 58 weeks following the occurrence of the particular accidents involved.
