## Senior Citizens Housing Plan In Prince Awaiting Approval

**SUMMERSIDE** — Hon. Henry Wedge, minister of welfare and labor, said yesterday, that sites for the construction of 30 senior citizens housing units, to be built in Prince County communities at a cost of \$225,000, have been staked off.  
 However, until an order-in-council has been passed by the federal government, construction cannot begin on the projects, he stated.  
 Mr. Wedge said he has been assured that the order-in-council will be dealt with by Dec. 1. He will be in Ottawa this weekend, he said, and if the project is passed successfully, he will send word to the Island so the projects can start.  
 Representatives of Central Mortgage and Housing, recently in the county, approved all locations and specifications of the homes, to be built in Summerside, Alberton, Wellington, O'Leary and Kensington.  
 Tenders for the construction of the homes were called by CMHC on the 14th of September. Approximately 100 men will be employed in the erection of the homes under the winter works program.  
 Eligibility for the homes is based on age and the total income of couples, which should not exceed \$50 per month and be no less than \$10 per month. Rental of the homes has been set at \$50 per month.
