36 Graduate At Kensington

KENSINGTON—Premier Walter R. Shaw told graduating students at the regional high school here last night that they couldn't "be too highly educated" and said the drop outs and those who have not got that higher education "are going to be left in the pick and shovel work".

Addressing the graduates further, he said "you are on your own now. You are going into the greatest university of all—the university of life!"

Premier Shaw, who also presented the diplomas and certificates to the grade 12 graduates and the governor-general's medal to Gordon Murray, was introduced to the capacity audience by the chairman of the school board, Austin Pendergast.

The principal of the school, James R. Murphy, gave a report on the year's activities and said the 1964-65 school year had

been an eventful one with an increase in enrollment which required the hiring of an extra teacher.

The Royal Canadian Legion last evening made a donation of \$100 to purchase books for the school library.

Marjorie MacKay, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland MacKay, gave the valedictory address.

Late in the program the students presented gifts to all the teachers including three who will not be at the school next year, Mrs. Merle Cole, William Arsenault and George Doughart.

Address By President Closes CWL Annual

"We, the people of God, the laity, members of the Catholic Women's League, came not for ourselves alone but for others," said Catherine A. Toal of London, Ont., national president of the CWL, as she addressed the concluding session of the 43rd annual provincial convention held at Mt. St. Mary's last night.

Miss Toal in developing the theme of the convention went on to say "the layman cannot be an expert in every subject. Much less can he devote his time to every good civic cause. What he must have is a wide interest in all civic problems, know the Catholic and Papal teaching on the matter and devote time if possible to at least one area of civic life in which he is especially interested or capable."

The guest speaker remarked that the Christian woman who continually says "Let Jane do it" has forgotten "I am my brother's keeper."

The Commons debated a resolution to set up an Indian claims commission after passing amendments to fishermen's loans.

The loans bill increases the maximum to \$10,000 from \$4,000 and extends the repayment time to 10 years from eight.

Citizenship Minister Nicholson said the claims commission should settle problems that have built up over 100 years.

The legislation would incorporate many suggestions made by Indians themselves on ancient treaty rights.

The bill was introduced and given first reading.

The Commons approved changes in customs duties and tariffs set out in the latest budget.

Under the tariff changes a magazine with more than five per cent of ads aimed at Canada would be prohibited entry.

Tuesday, June 22

The Commons meets at 2:30 p.m. for second reading of the Indian Claims Commission Bill. The Senate meets at 8 p.m.

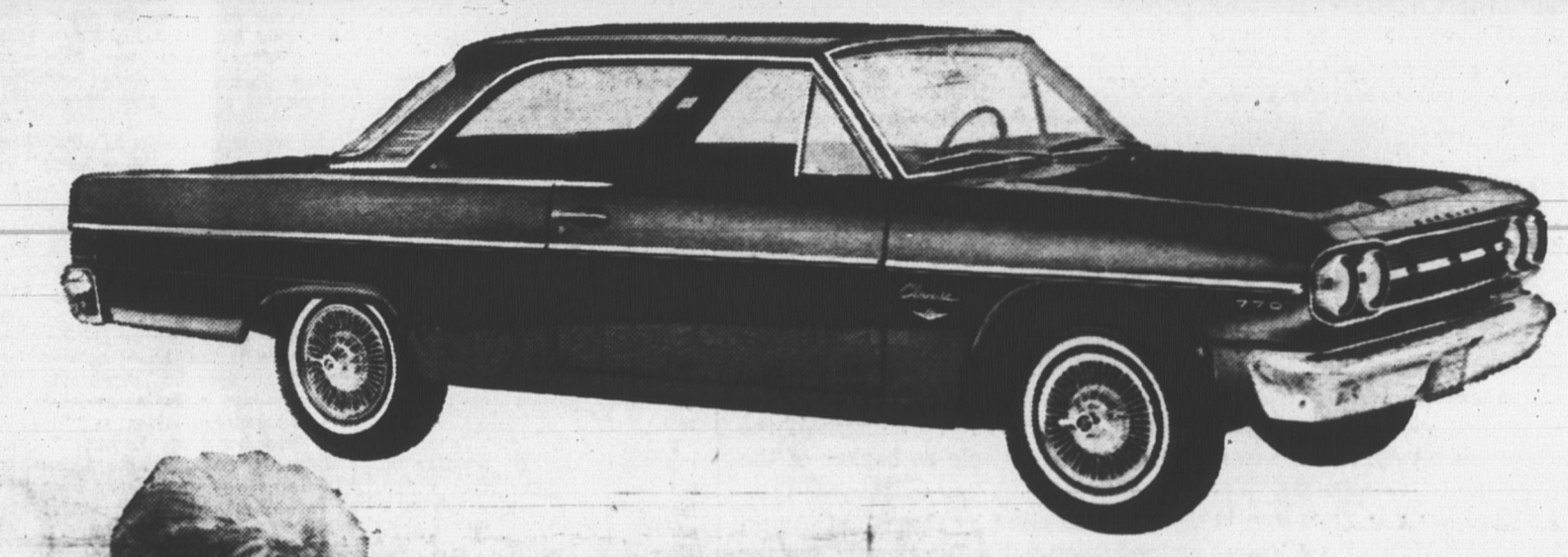
