The Charlottetown Abbies moved into first place in the City Hockey League standings by defeating the previously unbeaten Summerside Aces 9-5 at the Forum last night. The Abbies have won five games while losing one against the Aces last night.

The game was an hour late getting underway due to the late arrival of the Summerside team. Despite their late arrival, however, the Aces lost no time when they got on the ice and proceeded to jump into a 1-0 lead early in the game on a goal by Romaine.

The Abbies came back to score five times before the period ended as they forced the attack. The Aces drew to within a goal of the winners in the middle period but the Abbies rebounded in the third frame to wrap up the contest.

Harold "Red" Howatt, playing his best game of the year, scored three goals to lead the winners assault. Howatt also came up with a fine back checking performance and his two goals early in the third period, put the game out of reach of the Aces.

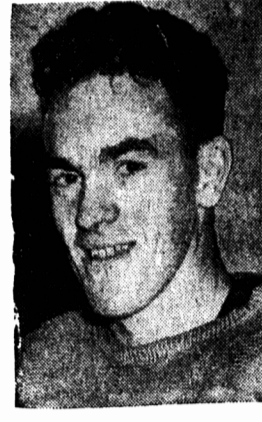

Jr. Greenshirts' Coach Suspended

KEMPVILLE, Ont. (CP)—W. B. George, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, announced Thursday he has suspended coach Stanley Long of the junior Kitchener Greenshirts for one year.

The suspension, which dates from Feb. 12, 1954, resulted from Long calling his team off the ice in protest over the referees' ruling in a Quebec-Ontario junior hockey game against the Marquis at Jonquiere, Que., last Friday night.

The team left the ice at the 17-minute mark of the second period after referee Ken Mullins of Montreal disallowed a Kitchener goal. Mullins ruled that he blew the whistle at the same time as the goal was scored.

League Leading Atlantics Here Tonight; Ford Has Chance To Set New Record

The Islanders, four points behind the Miners, will be at full strength.

Orin Carver had quite a night at Antigonish as he scored two goals and assisted on four more. Spike Laliberte and Paul Saindon also scored twice.

Canadiens Come From Behind To Defeat Detroit

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens spotted Detroit Red Wings two early goals Thursday night and then dominated play almost the rest of the route to defeat the league leaders 4-2.

It was the Wings' first game of a two-game stand here and they appeared tired after their 0-0 tie in Toronto Wednesday night. They also absorbed heavy bodychecks at the hands of the Montrealers in the fast, slam-bang game before a crowd of 14,501.

Ken Mosdell, Maurice (Rocket) Richard, Bert Olmstead and Elmer Lach scored for Montreal and Red Kelly and Ted Lindsay for Detroit.

The win moved Canadiens back into a tie with Toronto Maple Leafs for second place in the National Hockey League standings.

The game opened with an outburst of penalties, referee Frank Ujvari assessing seven in the first 45 seconds for a total of 31 minutes.

Rookie Bill Dineen of the Wings drew a double major, which carries an automatic misconduct and later in the game Detroit goalie Terry Sawchuk also drew a misconduct when he chased the referee about the ice to protest vehemently against Olmstead's goal, which proved to be the winner.

Dineen and Olmstead slugged it out in a bitter fight in the opening seconds and the Montreal player was given a minor for cross-checking and a major for fighting. Dineen's two majors were for high sticking, which drew blood and for fighting.

Little more than half a minute later Richard was given a double minor—for slashing and high-sticking Tony Lewick—and with a man advantage the Red Wings whipped in their two goals in 46 seconds.

Weakened Miners Edge Halifax Atlantics 4-3

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP)—The weakened Glace Bay Miners edged the leading Halifax Atlantics 4-3 Thursday night in a fight-ridden Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The win put Miners 2 1/2 games behind second-place Sydney Millionaires and three games ahead of last-place Charlottetown Islanders.

Glace Bay, who lost forwards Bobby Brown and Johnny Lumley to their home teams, split two goals in the first period, scored an unanswered goal in the second and kept pace with Atlantics with two third-period markers.

Gordie Miller paced Miners with two goals, and the others went to Kervin Rochford and Gordie Myles. Muckle Hollett, Gene LeClerc and Ross Watson tallied for Halifax.

After a mild first period of the free-wheeling game, Halifax lost forward Bob Bowness through a match misconduct in the second and Carroll Bloom in the third.

Allie Reynolds Still Refuses To Sign With Yanks

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Yankees signed two minor players Thursday but failed to lure big chief Allie Reynolds into the fold.

Relief pitcher Bob Kuzava, a 6-5 man last season, and shortstop Willie Miranda agreed to terms. Reynolds held his second in-person conference with Roy Hamey, the club's contract trouble shooter, then headed back to Oklahoma.

Reynolds is believed to be asking about \$40,000 for his services, an increase of some \$2,500 over last season. He has turned down two contracts by mail and one report said both of them called for slight cuts in salary.

Reynolds was a 20-game winner in 1952 but posted only a 13-7 mark last season when he was used mostly in relief.
