Local and Other Items.

DECIDES ALL PRIZE FIGHTS.—George Siler, the referee, makes specific charges that prize fights in New York city are controlled by certain Democratic politicians and that referees are ordered beforehand how the battle must end.

NATIONAL PATRIOTIC FUND.—The National Patriotic Fund as outlined by the Governor-General is for the benefit of Canadians attached to the military forces in South Africa, their families and dependents. Each of the big railway companies have subscribed \$15,000. It has now reached the sum of \$50,000, and is rapidly increasing.

FROM NOVA SCOTIA.—Mr. Charles A. Partigan, an experienced grower and packer of fruit, at Wolfville, N. S. will be present at the annual meeting of the Fruit-Growers' Association in this city on the 24th inst., by request, and will give some useful information. All are invited to attend. TENDERS ASKED FOR.—An Ottawa despatch says the department of trade and commerce is calling for a steamship service between Charlottetown and either Bristol, Liverpool or Manchester, commencing June 1st, and covering six round trips. The service is for three years. Tenders are asked also for a daily summer service between Summerside and Point du Chene, and between Charlottetown and Picton, both for five years. The tenders are to be in by February 15th.

A COSTLY CUP.—A woman who had an Arabic glass cup of the 14th century and did not know its value took it to the British Museum, says the Boston Advertiser. After due consideration the expert, to her surprise, said that though the museum did not want it, it might be worth \$2,000. The woman shuddered because she had been carrying in a crowded London omnibus a bit of glass worth so much money, and it had miraculously escaped smashing. Finally, wanting money more than Arabian glass, she sent the object to an auctioneer's. For her amazement when, starting at \$2,500, the Arabic cup went by leaps and bounds and was finally knocked down for the nice sum of \$6,500. Actually the Arabic cup was worth very much less, but it so happened that there were two rivals at the auction, who bid against each other.

NEW IDEAS.—There is a fortune awaiting the inventor who can discover a successful method for the preservation of eggs. The long severe winter in this region renders it absolutely essential to preserve eggs, if they are to be had during this season. The principle involved in preserving eggs is the preservation of the mucilaginous coating, which naturally covers the shell, and which prevents the entrance of the germs of decomposition. When the coating is removed, the egg begins to become "stale", and the process of decay actually begins. The use of lime and salt as means of preservation, never entirely successful, does not preserve the protecting covering on the shell, and no process can be successful unless it does this. Experiments have shown that water glass comes more nearly being a perfect preservative than anything that has hitherto been employed. There is always danger of the bursting of the shell of an egg that is thus preserved, when in hot water, but this disadvantage may be overcome by carefully piercing it with a needle. The question will naturally arise, if the preservation of the surface of the shell in its natural condition is all that is necessary to preserve the egg, why could it not be coated with some preparation that would answer that purpose. It could be. Vaseline will preserve it and might be used on a small scale, but it would require too much time, and consequently expense, to use this means extensively. It should be within the power of some inventor to discover some simple and cheap method of preserving eggs, and thereby not only gain a fortune but also bestow an inestimable benefit upon the human race by placing within the reach of all a necessary article of food. 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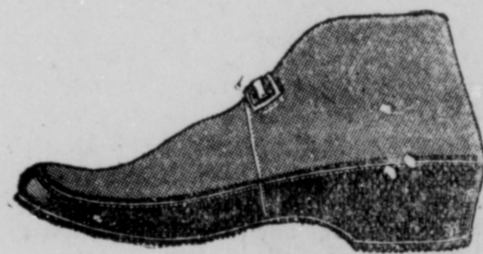

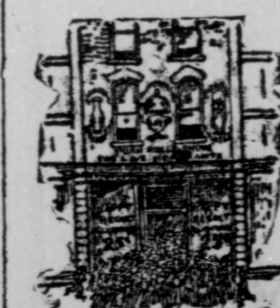
