Old Models Of Russian MiGs Prove They Still Have Sting

WASHINGTON (CP) — The horse-and-buggy models of the Soviet MIG jet fighter family still carry a sting, the United States learned last week over North Viet Nam.

At least two of the decade-old jets pounced and ran knocking down two bigger, faster American fighter-bombers before ducking into clouds.

The MIGs were either 15s or 17s. They came from behind and the covering United States Super-Sabre F-100s appeared to be caught napping. One missile and one burst of cannon fire evidently hit nothing.

Friday, the U.S. Navy gained a measure of revenge on China's dog-step when it was reported that a MIG was last seen in flames.

The MIG series is named after the Soviet designers Mikoyan and Gurevich. The MIG 15 was the early combat plane for the Chinese in the Korean War, capable of 670 miles an hour. The MIG-17 appeared a bit later with a shade more speed at a maximum 730 miles an hour and a bit more altitude at 57,000 feet.

But both were swept-wing, single-jet fighters. They were similar to the MIG 17's American counterpart, the F-86 Sabre which also served Canada at home and in the NATO air division in Europe through most of the 1950s.

FEATURES DELTA WING
North Viet Nam is believed to have about 30 MIGs donated by China. China itself has some of the more advanced 19s and 21s. The MIG 19 design features the delta wing and greater size common to development in all fighter aircraft.

Russia alone, it is believed, has the MIG 23 rated internationally as equal to anything in the U.S. stable.

The basic advantage of the MIG 15, 17 or Sabre being flown against modern aircraft is ability to manoeuvre, coupled with surprise if possible. On the straightaway, it is no contest. The F-100 Super Sabres caught napping Sunday are successors to the Sabre. They appeared in 1954 and are designed to fly a maximum 870 miles an hour and tote 7,500 pounds of bombs or missiles.

The F-105 Thunderchief appeared five years ago with a top speed of 1,500 miles an hour.

One puzzle about Sunday's loss of two planes has been why the U.S. force fired only one missile. This is the Sidewinder, which bears in on the enemy aircraft by "scenting" the heat of its engine.

Russia also has such equipment and China is believed to have it.

The MIG believed destroyed Friday was hit by a U.S. Navy F-4, which Canada pondered and rejected for its next jet series. This F-4, or Phantom, has been clocked at 1,600 miles an hour.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

The bidding:
South West North East
1 ♠ 1 ♠ Dbie. Pass
4 ♠ 4 ♠ Dbie. Pass
5 ♠ Pass 5 ♠ Dbie.

Opening lead—king of spades.
This astonishing hand occurred in the match between France and the United States during the First World Bridge Olympiad played in Turin in 1960.

When an American pair held the North-South cards, the bidding went as shown. The double of one spade was conventional. It was not a business double; it showed a hand of moderate strength with length in hearts as well. From then on, the bidding was fairly normal, even if the final result was not.

West led a spade and continued with a spade, which South ruffed. Declarer played the ace of diamonds, West showing out, and then finessed the queen of hearts. He next led two rounds of clubs, East ruffing the second one.

East returned a spade, ruffed in the closed hand. South now played a heart, allowing West to win with the jack, but East still had to make two trump tricks and the contract went down three—800 points.

At the second table, where a French pair held the North-South cards, the bidding went:

South West North East
1 ♠ 1 ♠ 2 ♠ 3 ♠
4 ♠ 4 ♠ 5 ♠ Dbie.

The bidding was not as lengthy, but the same unfortunate contract was reached.

Declarer ruffed the second round of spades, led a club to the jack, and played the queen of diamonds, covered by the king and ace. He then finessed the queen of hearts, cashed the ace, and ruffed a heart.

When he now played a club, East ruffed, cashed the jack of diamonds, continued with a spade, and the outcome was that this South also went down three to tie the result at the first table.

All the time, either South player could have bid and made five clubs for plus 600, instead of going down 800!

China Rejects LBJ's Proposal For Discussion

TOKYO (AP) — China has rejected President Johnson's "unconditional discussion" proposal for peaceful settlement of the fighting in South Viet Nam. It termed his speech "full of lies and deception."

A commentary broadcast by Peking Radio said the only thing new in Johnson's Baltimore speech was his offer of "unconditional discussions." But even this is "old stuff" because the object is to disarm South Vietnamese people, force them to give up the fight and have the U.S. military remain to run the country as they wish, the broadcast said.

The Communist broadcast in an hour and the Soviet counterpart would be the MIG 21.

But in the turns or in the clouds, the older MIGs are still a menace.
