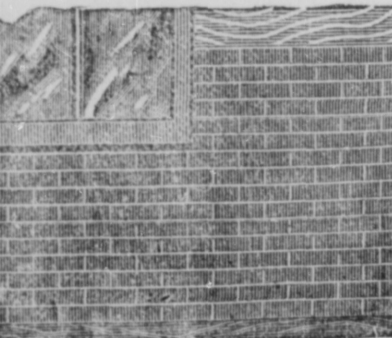

CANNIBALISM REPORTED.

Terrible Tale of Suffering From the Yukon.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—A story of possible cannibalism and death on the Yukon trail has just reached here. Three men who left Dabl on December 5 for Kinton, were not heard of again and they were supposed to have been lost. Nothing was heard of them here till the steamer Rideout, which arrived today, brought a terrible tale of suffering and horror.

The men were Michael Edgar, Thomas Daly and M. Provost. They were from Providence, R. I., Woonsocket, R. I., and Brockton, Mass., respectively. Their bodies were discovered 175 miles from the mouth of Old Man's Cr ek, they having lost the trail and become bewildered. Having left Dahl River with only three weeks' food, but which was amply sufficient for the 150 miles to Kinton, they were soon reduced to starvation.

Daly's body was found partly eaten, on the stove in the tent just as it was left when death overtook them. Some scraps of moose had been found, of which they were endeavoring to fry a steak. Daly's body was identified by the clothes. The other two men were found dead five miles away from the tent. The fact that the tent flaps were shut down when found would destroy the theory that Daly's body was eaten by animals. The men were probably driven by hunger to cannibalism.

Murray Harbor Notes.

The farmers in general have finished cropping with the exception of sowing a few late turnips, etc. In consequence of the insufficient coating of snow last winter to protect the clover from the severe frosts the outlook for a hay crop is much less promising than last season.

Mr. Wm. Sharam, general merchant, has had his store enlarged and greatly improved. With his increasing trade, he found that his store was too small to carry on his business with success and satisfaction. But he is now well equipped to meet the requirements of his customers.

Mr. Jas H Brooks, carriage builder and painter, is being kept very busy having had several dwelling houses to paint and beautify besides his usual carriage work which is extensive. He was therefore obliged to get another smart young apprentice.

A late Guardian informs us that a Mr Campbell of Cape Traverse had in his possession a freak of nature—a blue lobster. About a week before this appeared in the Guardian Mr. Isaac Stewart of this place caught one of the same race a blue one,—in all probability a brother to the one Mr. Campbell caught. Blue lobsters are a rarity no doubt; but even the black ones are also becoming very rare. Each year they are getting less numerous and a good many claim that this industry will have to be abandoned—for a few years at least—to allow them to become fruitful, multiply and replenish the sea.

Truly it is an infrequent occurrence to have snow here in summer; yet we had snow here on Wednesday last, and it rained very heavily the same day. As some will remember, this village was visited by snow about twelve years ago in the summer season. It was not, however, a fall of snow which clothes our fields and hillsides, caps our mountain top—etc; but Mr. Snow, captain of the seam tug Fred M. Batts which towed a barge here laden with salt for Messrs. Proves & Sons the rain having ceased the next morning being fine, the (captain) Snow and the two Batts, (the tug and engineer) disappeared before the rising sun (having left before sunrise) Captain Snow informs the writer that it is much easier to come up this harbor now than it was twelve years ago when he came up here with a schooner.

Mrs. E. Beck and family, and her cousin, Miss McKay, arrived here Saturday evening from Providence, R. I., also Miss Geneva Haberlin, from Boston.

Captain Hiram Hyde, of the schooner Sir John A. McDonald, called here today, returning from the maritime markets, where he has been with a load of potatoes. He is bound for Summerside laden with coal. Captain J. McKinnon went by the Electric today to Pictou to market his load of potatoes which is now in Pictou.

A Grit Bark.

SIR,—I notice in THE DAILY EXAMINER of June 15th, a letter signed "Liberal," putting forth reasons why Robert Jenkins should be selected as a Conservative candidate for the third district of Queen's. In the beginning I wish to state that I have nothing to say to say against Mr. Jenkins or his abilities; but I most surely have objections to the principles enunciated by "Liberals" on which he should represent us, viz: temperance and reform. Is "Liberal" so politically blind that he does not realize what his party has done in the matter of temperance? Nor could he insult the electors worse, in the next contest. He therefore, by proposing Mr. Jenkins, thinks to cause dissension in the Conservative ranks by setting Mr. Jenkins against Mr. McLean. Now we do not want any grit tricks, and will not tolerate any grit foolery. "Liberal" says that Mr. Jenkins is averse to entering political life. We believe that, for he has more sound sense and ability than to take up the principles that the Grits have thrown away or to listen to the voice of the charmer alluring him on to cause dispute in the ranks of the Liberal Conservative party.

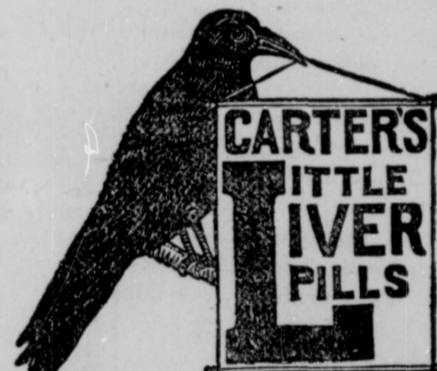
