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Religion and Life

There is an old legend of a spring which the fairies haunted. They claimed ability to dye any fabric into any color its owner desired. So the people around would leave their garments by the spring with a thread over each showing the new color desired, and the next morning they would be found with the garments new hues shining in the sunlight. But one day a woman left a black robe for the fairies with a white thread over it, and this time nothing happened. The fairies could not dye a white fabric into any other color, but they could not make black white. What is impossible in the physical world is possible in the spiritual realm. A man once came to his minister to sign the pledge. He had a friend with him to witness his signature. With a laugh he called himself the black sheep in a good flock, and his family heritage showed itself in a massive forehead, but his habits in every other line of his countenance. The minister drew up the pledge—all the while doubting his friend's ability to keep it; he had broken every resolution he had made up to that moment. The result was to show that the minister failed to discern the sincerity in this new move. It was merely a vow to change his habits that his signature to that pledge expressed; it was a personal commitment of his life in all its depth and height to the Lord Jesus. The change wrought in him was so complete that that not only were his old habits abandoned, but the very desire for the old indulgences was taken away. In the old circumstances, and they were rough and hard, he lived a new life. There is a spring of living water in which the black can be made white—the Scripture phrase is "Whiter than snow."

"What must I do to be saved?" The question is as old as Christianity, and the answer is as new as the morning paper: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and you will be saved." The above is no mere fairy story; it is an actual fact.

At the moment the writer's desk is loaded with facts of this type. A communication from the Yonge Street Mission, that noble centre of practical help and spiritual renewal, tells me of a life all wrong made all right. Reports from two Christian organizations in our college glow with accounts of lives transformed, and the pages livener with gladness. The church paper describes mass movements toward God. Moral failures can become moral successes. The Victor of Calvary becomes the victor in every life entrusted to Him.

What was behind St. Paul's answer to his jailer that grim night when the earthquake in Philippi set the prisoners free? It will be remembered that Jesus gave a similar answer to critics who asked: "What must we do, to be doing the work of God?" Jesus re-

plied: "This is the work of God that you believe in Him whom He has sent." What is meant by belief in Christ which brought about the moral transformations just described? It means more than believing His words spoken 1900 years ago. It means personal commitment to Christ, the conqueror of sin and death. This, in turn, implies that Jesus is alive, that He is accessible to everyone who means business in His desire for a changed life, and that He will use His power to make new the person who trusts Him. He has already settled by His Cross the issue raised by man's sin, and is ready to make that salvation available to anyone who is ready to accept it.

A woman once complained: "You say I must trust Christ; I don't know what it means to trust."
Her friend answered: "Have you ever learned to float?"
"Well, I've tried to."
"Now isn't that the reason you didn't succeed?"
"To float one must just let go, and let the water near you up. The water will do its part if the swimmer trusts it; then she is free to use her strength to go ahead."
In the same way, trust in Christ means entrustment, venture, commitment. I gave myself over to Him, I who have failed to make of myself what I want to be, that He may make of me what life has designed.

We cannot kill witch-grass with the lawn-mower; we must dig out its roots. We cannot make the great change in ourselves that God calls for by lopping off this or that bad habit; life must be renewed at its centre. Our words and deeds express our nature; what we do comes out of what we are. According to an ancient proverb: "Out of the heart are the issues of life." When we come to the living Christ there must be no holding back; in our surrender to Him it must be all or nothing. But the moment we give He takes. It is His approach which awakens in us the desire for better things; and it is as true today as when these words were written: "He is able to save to the uttermost all who come to God through Him."

Let us enter the doctor's office again and read: I had no shoes and I murmured until I saw a man with no feet; or recall with me the victim of World War One which I saw in Camp Hill Hospital being led down stairs, both eyes gone, both hands off, and one side paralysed! How could we pay a man like that—to whom the world was dark, the hand-clasp with a friend no longer possible, the elastic step of youth gone forever. Think of that and realize what our debt is to those who suffered for us.
