## GOVERNMENTAL INJUSTICE.

The Montreal Star to hand this morning, contains a lengthy letter which sets forth a very gross case of injustice and tyranny on the part of the present Liberal Government of Canada. It is well known that the government, early in its career, took the important business of printing postage stamps, etc., out of the hands of Mr. Burland, of Montreal, and gave it to an alien company in New York. More than that the government refused to pay an officially certified account of Mr. Burland for about \$10,000. The correctness of the account was admitted, but Mr. Mulock took a position in respect to it which is thus stated:

"I won't pay you that unless and until you hand me over the plates." "Certainly" was the reply of Mr. Burland, "but you will please pay me for these as provided by the terms of the contract." This Mr. Mulock flatly refused and declared that so long as he was a Minister not one cent of the account of ten thousand dollars, admitted to be due for work done, should ever be paid till the plates and dies were given up without any payment for them. "Mr. Burland through his legal adviser then asked for the issue of a fiat so as to be allowed to sue the Government for the amount. But this further request was stubbornly and repeatedly refused; and Mr. Mulock, moreover, threatened the direful things that he would do unless Mr. Burland gave up his rights and knuckled under. "Mr. Mulock attempted to carry out his threat and prevailed on his colleague, Mr. Mills, to bring down an amendment to the Criminal Code, having for its object to declare Mr. Burland's position a crime and imprisonment in the penitentiary the punishment for it."

We have not space for the whole letter. The gist of the case is contained in the above extract. Mr. Mulock stubbornly refuses to pay the account or to permit the issue of a fiat enabling Mr. Burland to obtain a judgment in the court, though it is plainly stated in his contract with the government that Mr. Burland shall be paid for the plates in his possession as a condition of handing them over.

The matter is one of importance in itself. The idea of passing criminal legislation to apply to the particular case of one man is repugnant to British ideas of justice; and the refusal of the common rights open to all except those who deal with a government, of a trial of the matter before a court of law is "cowardly in the extreme." But it is particularly interesting here, inasmuch as our Provincial Government has acted in a similarly arbitrary and cowardly manner with regard to Mr. Walter Lowe.

In view of the advantage which our truly Liberal Governments take of their powers, the passage of a law enabling public contractors and others to carry their claims against the government of the day to the courts of law and justice, is necessary. Or else the Governor General and the Lieutenant Governors ought to be called upon and authorized to exercise their prerogative of issuing such fiat, independently of their constitutional advisers, in cases in which justice may seem to warrant such action. If we mistake not the Lieutenant Governor exercised this prerogative independently.

—Some of the papers are involving the people of Ontario in the scandalous electoral jobbery and corruption recently exposed in West Elgin and other Ontario ridings. The fact of the matter is that the body of the people of Ontario are as innocent in the matter as those of P. E. Island. But it is easily seen that a few rascals may destroy the character of a whole people if only the people tolerate them. Out with the rascals—that is the lesson for the people of Ontario, and of Canada at large.

## MINISTERIAL SALARIES.

"Times change and men change with them." A few years ago, when the Conservatives were in office the Liberal politicians and the Liberal newspapers never let slip an opportunity to animadvert upon the number of members in the cabinet and the large amounts each was receiving from the public treasury; while if one of the Conservative ministers took a palace car at the public expense the fact was heralded throughout the length and breadth of Canada. But now, when the Liberals are in power, we hear not a word about the number of ministers in the cabinet; but we hear occasional insinuating appeals for larger salaries, and we see ministerial trains running or government yachts sailing wherever ministers want to go.

A few days ago the fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has not more income than just enough to live upon was brought out in relation to his purchase of a house of which he was compelled to give a mortgage; and the St. John Telegraph remarks that "all the cabinet ministers of Canada ought to be paid on a more liberal scale than at present. It is now quite impossible for them to save anything out of their salaries, and this is a state of affairs that ought not to be allowed to continue." It is needless to say that if this is true now it was true when the Conservatives were in power and when the Telegraph was commenting upon the extravagance of the administration which paid the Premier \$8000, and other ministers at the rate of \$7000 each, per year. But the Telegraph now remarks that:

"Considering the fact that Canada is a nation in point of population these salaries seem miserably small. Cape Colony, which has a smaller white population than Nova Scotia, pays its premier a larger salary than is paid to the Premier of Canada. The premier of New South Wales, with only one-fifth the population of Canada, receives \$9000 a year. Victoria pays its premier \$7000 and little Tasmania, with only half as many inhabitants as New Brunswick gives its premier a salary just half as large as that paid to the premier of Canada."

The Liberals in office see with other eyes than those they had when in Opposition. Or perhaps they have obtained new and improved gold rimmed spectacles!

## NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The British oil seed trust, with a capital of over \$11,000,000, is as yet unorganized. Trusts don't exist in free-trade England, eh?

—By treaties with the Great Powers, which went into operation yesterday, Japan is now, for the first time, recognized by the nations as an equal in every respect.

—The prince of Naples has established classes in agriculture in the Neapolitan army corps, to meet the objection that the soldiers lose their agricultural habits during their compulsory service.

—The rainfall all over the northern part of the world has been unusually heavy this year. The Ottawa Journal reports that "the heavy rain has had a bad effect on the crops in general. Low lying districts have been practically drowned out. An evidence of this was to be seen yesterday in the low places at the Experimental Farm which were covered in some parts with a foot of water."

—The Patriot seems to think that if it can only say "you're another," it has given a sufficient answer to the charges of gross and recent electoral rascality and corruption preferred against the Liberal party. It is needless to say that, even if it could truthfully adduce the *tu quoque* argument, the argument would go for nothing. But The Patriot may safely be challenged to bring forward any well established case to match the guilt of that which has been confessed by Mr. Donald Macneish.

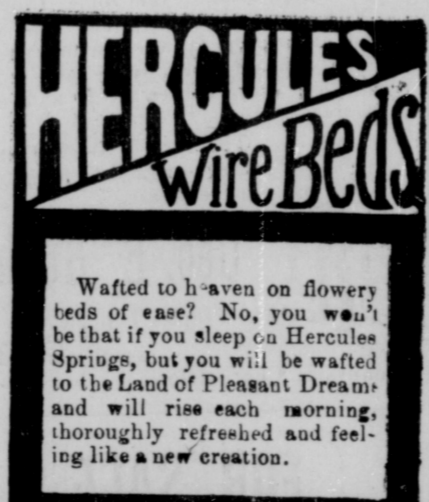
