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## Diver Claims Sub Wreckage Found In Long Island Sound

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—"It's a weird and eerie feeling," said Lee Prettyman, local diver and marine salvage expert, after a dive in Long Island Sound to take pictures of what he believes to be the sunken French submarine Surcouf, lost in 1942.

Prettyman hopes to prove conclusively by using dynamite charges to clear off barnacles and other debris, his discovery is really the Surcouf, the world's largest submarine which spent some time in Halifax during the Second World War.

Prettyman said he has heard rumors of a renegade submarine refueling in Newport, R.I., several times before the United States entered the Second World War and then serving German submarines. Another rumor at the time, he said, told of a French-speaking German crew taking over the sub before it was sunk.

The French navy says the Surcouf, which measured 361 feet in length and displaced 4,500 tons, was sunk after being rammed by an American merchantman 80 miles off Cristobal, Panama, Feb. 18, 1942.

## GM Continue To Set Pace

TORONTO (CP)—General Motors continues to pace Canadian car makers to another record year.

Total cars and trucks produced to the week ending May 29 was 306,193, compared with 353,362 vehicles produced by the same time last year.

## Barbadians Offered Jobs In Homeland

MONTREAL (CP)—Ten inquiries have been received from Canada-based Barbadians interested in taking jobs in their homeland under the island's new four-year economic development program.

Among those contemplating returning to Barbados to help in the government's campaign to raise the standard of living and provide improved community services for the 250,000 residents, a nurse, and an economist.

Premier Errol Barrow has said Barbados badly needs university-trained administrators, businessmen and engineers and experienced craftsmen of all types.

"What I am doing is compiling an inventory of the available range of skills of Barbadians living in Canada, so the government can tailor and modify its development program accordingly," Mr. Barrow said.

The Barbadian government after studying the completed questionnaire forms forwarded by Mr. Barrow, will get in touch with suitable applicants, and pay the return passage of those accepted.

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

North East South West  
1 ♠ Pass 1 ♠ Pass  
2 ♠ Pass ?

What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠A94 ♥K82 ♦J73 ♣K62  
2. ♠Q8742 ♥93 ♦J54 ♣QJ6  
3. ♠K9653 ♥7 ♦QJ82 ♣KJ3  
4. ♠AJ985 ♥KQ53 ♦6 ♣A84

1. Three trump. There is a good chance of a slam, but there is nothing better to do at the moment than jump to three trump. Partner obviously has a good hand, since he bid his suits in reverse order and was willing to risk a three diamond preference if we happened to have a poor hand and better diamonds than hearts.

In the sequence shown, North is required to have longer diamonds than hearts as well as at least 17 points. All we can do at this point is mark time by leaping to three trump. It would be wrong to bid only two trump, because that bid might well be made with a hand containing some four or five points less than we actually have.

2. Three diamonds. Having barely enough values to have scraped up the first response, we should try to slow North down by bidding three dia-

were no survivors and his own sub was sunk two days later. The former German sailor, now in the U.S. Navy, claimed the Surcouf had been selling the Germans fuel.

To prove his claim, the diver hopes soon to set off three charges of dynamite on the bow, conning tower and aft sections of the sunken ship. In this way, he hopes to find the identification plate and prove it is the French submarine.

Prettyman, who spent approximately 45 minutes photographing the vessel Sunday, said it was a "weird feeling, almost like robbing a grave."

The diver said he spent most of the time around the conning tower of the sub.
