THANKS EXPRESSED

In an open letter to the organization read by Mrs. Gates, Dr. O. M. Found, director of TB control for the Province, on behalf of the Minister of Health, the Island TB League, and himself, thanked the provincial women for the unselfish efforts they had shown in co-operating with the Province.

Dr. Found stated that to date 50,000 of the Island's eligible citizens had attended to clinics by means of which 22 cases requiring treatment had been discovered. In the 400 school districts completed thus far attendance had

averaged 85 per cent. Dr. Found added.

Before the convention closed Mrs. Keith Rand, of Port Williams, N.S., president of the FWIC which is holding its 21st annual board meeting in Charlottetown, thanked the members of the P.E.I. W.I. for the many courtesies shown her and the other members of the board during their stay on P.E.I.

Mrs. Rand stated that she was particularly delighted with the tray which had been presented to her as a souvenir of her visit to the Island. She added that the souvenir coasters given each of the other Board members would remind all of the "very happy time spent with our Island Institute women."

RESOLUTIONS

One resolution approved at the final session of the two-day convention asked the department of health take immediate steps to replace the two psychiatrists who recently resigned from the Riverside Hospital staff.

Another asked that more rest room facilities be established in the City of Charlottetown, while a third gave approval to the current proposal to establish Fort Amherst as a national historic park.

In a rider to this latter resolution it was suggested that the development and future maintenance of the park should be paid for by the federal government. Island storekeepers were urged to provide better quality women's garments in the larger sizes in a resolution passed at the morning session.

The W.I. delegates pointed out that the better quality of goods is to be found in the size 12 to 14 clothing a classification in which very few of the rural women belong.

FAMILY ALLOWANCES

Continuation of family allowances beyond the age of 16 to children attending high school was strongly supported by the institute delegates.

They point out that the discontinuance of family allowances at age 16 comes at a time when the child creates the greatest expenses to his parents.
