Another Company Advances Newsprint

QUEBEC, June 7—(CP)—Anglo Canadian Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, has announced it has increased the price of its newsprint \$10 per ton, effective July 1.

Elliot M. Little, Anglo president, said the price boost was caused by "increases in the cost of wood and of labor."

Mr. Little said clients of his firm were advised Friday. The boost brings the price of newsprint to \$116 a ton in New York, and \$112 in Canada exclusive of a 10 per cent tax in Canada.

This was the third similar announcement by newsprint companies since last week. The first was by Abitibi Power and Paper Company in Toronto, and today an announcement of the increase came from Consolidated Paper Corporation in Montreal.
