800 More Islanders Eligible For Pensions

Because of recent changes in the Old Age Security Act, 800 additional P.E.I. residents will receive old age pensions in 1966. J. E. Green, regional director of old age security said yesterday.

Minimum age requirements were dropped from 70 to 69.

All those born on or before Dec. 31, 1896, who are not receiving the pension now, are urged to send an application to the Old Age Security office, the Dominion building, Charlottetown, as soon as possible because of time needed to process these requests.

Mr. Green also pointed out that age requirements will drop progressively so that, by January, 1970, the minimum age for the pension will be 65. This will mean that some 12,000 Islanders, compared to the present 8,000 (approximately), will be receiving the pension.

Another change in the Old Age Security Act will be of interest to retired persons, and to those about to retire. In the past anyone who had retired to live in another country was required to return to Canada for one full year before qualifying for the pension. This will no longer be necessary if an applicant can establish that he has resided in Canada for 40 years after reaching age 18. Anyone, for example, who has lived in Canada continuously for 58 years or who has spent the minimum of 40 years in Canada after his 18th birthday, may now qualify for the pension without returning to Canada.

According to Mr. Green, many people now absent from Canada under this new feature of the pension Act, he suggested that anyone who would like to have further information on this point should contact the Old Age Security office.

Mr. Green emphasized that everyone within three years of pensionable age should have a birth or baptismal certificate to establish his correct date of birth. With the added number of applications to be processed, he stated that the demands on his office staff will be increased, and it may not be possible to give as much assistance as in the past in establishing the date of birth.

Hence, Mr. Green stressed, all persons now over 60 years of age should ensure that they have either a birth or baptismal certificate, or any other question regarding proof of age, the Old Age Security office should be contacted for free consultation.

CNR Ferry Traffic Up For April

Canadian National Railways has reported a 63.2 per cent increase in passengers and a 41.6 per cent increase in vehicles during April on the Borden-Tormentine ferry run.

The increases represented 13,038 more passengers and 4,469 more passengers and vehicles than during the comparable month of 1964 and were chiefly due to the Easter holiday period falling in April this year.

Rail passenger handlings, including those carried on the CN charter bus service commenced April 26, increased by 13.8 per cent.

There were 15,202 vehicles carried during the month and included 12,232 cars, 1,873 trucks, 1,000 tractor trailers, 87 buses and four motorcycles.

They accounted for 33,666 passengers. Rail and CN charter bus carried 2,362 persons to and from Prince Edward Island on the ferry service.

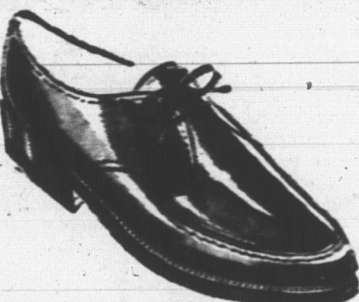
