Our Hospitals

This Province has every reason to be proud of its public hospitals. This week the annual meetings of two of these have been held, Prince County and P. E. I., and highly satisfactory reports submitted.

In the annual meeting of the P. E. I. Hospital subscribers last evening a great deal of interest was evinced because of the promise of a surprise announcement. Certainly it was an announcement that delighted the hearts of subscribers, directors, administration, staff and patients alike.

Perhaps the most highly pleased individual at last night's meeting was Mr. W. K. ROGERS himself who made the announcement. It is true Mr. ROGERS has as his co-directors some of the most successful and enterprising business men in the City, but it is no disparagement to them to say that for many years, Mr. ROGERS has been the "main push" and inspiration of the great institution over which he so ably and disinterestedly presides.

Needy Fishermen's Grant

There seems still to be a good deal of misunderstanding among Liberal politicians with regard to the \$300,000 federal grant in aid of needy fishermen. As proposed in Parliament, this grant was interpreted by Mr. FINN, Liberal member for Halifax, to apply only to those who had been forced through economic conditions to abandon the fishery industry.

The Nova Scotia Legislature, more alert to the fishermen's interests, passed a bill authorizing expenditure up to \$100,000 for the purpose of taking advantage of the Ottawa grant. Announcement has now been made by Premier MACDONALD that his government has arranged to call a meeting of representative fishermen of the Province on May 26, in order that the opinions of those actually engaged in the industry might be obtained as to the best means of utilizing the federal and provincial grants.

Prior to the passing of the grant the Legislature of this Province empowered the CAMPBELL Government to provide for the administration of any fund which may be appropriated or provided to assist in the re-establishment of needy farmers and fishermen.

"No End To Taxation"

The latest discussions on taxation remove the subject far from the aims sought a few years ago, when it was accepted as a sound principle that overlapping and duplication should be eliminated.

It would be useless to try to disguise the truth with regard to the Provinces and many urban municipalities. Like the Federal Government itself, they want more money. But was there ever a time when they didn't? And is there any assurance that what is being attempted now, if carried through, would not be followed by other demands?

When explaining the object of the proposed amendment to the British North America Act to grant the Provinces the right to impose limited indirect taxation the Minister of Justice pointed out that the arrangement made for Federal subsidies to the Provinces in 1897 was copied by Hon. George Brown and others and that the policy was opposed at all times by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The Confederation grant was supposed to be final. But the Provinces kept going back successfully for more, although each occasion was intended to be the last. There has been no such thing as finally for this form of assistance, and there seems to be no limit to other demands.

As is well known, the Provinces were expected to get their revenue from direct taxes which the taxpayer could not pass along. Property taxes were intended to provide what revenue was needed by the municipalities. At the same time the Federal Government met the greater part of its requirements from customs duties and excise. The cost of the Great War upset everything; but even when war revenue taxes and other extraordinary imposts were devised they were not regarded as permanent. With a great depression following post-war products, modern man must thank the first, certainly the best, primitive farmer in the world, though until recently he got little credit for it.

It is necessary nevertheless, to lose sight of the fact that the trouble is due to the unusual conditions created rather than to unjust limitations in the fields of taxation? The bill now under way at Ottawa will establish a new set-up by opening the indirect revenue to Provincial Legislatures, with the probability that it will grow in extent if records of the past are any criterion. Although the Provinces may share their good luck with the municipalities and thus meet the complaints of the moment, where will it leave the taxpayers? After all, there is no money for taxes except what the people's purses contain.

Admitting, if need be, that property taxes cannot carry the municipal load, that the Provinces are hard pressed to get along with the direct form of taxation allotted to them, that the Federal Government cannot pay its way with customs and excise, is it to be assumed that the remedy lies in new and permanent imposts?

Both Premier-Provincial Treasurer and Minister of Finance Dunning recognized the extraordinary conditions which interfered with balanced budgets and recorded them separately in their statements. The implication was that this situation was not permanent. It is submitted that these extraordinary debts and expenditures and their carrying charges, whether belonging to Municipal, Provincial or Federal Governments, ought to be segregated, and that if new taxes are necessary these should be definitely earmarked for this special account, so that both might disappear together.

The indirect taxation field should not be opened to the Provinces if it can be prevented, even though some already have stepped into it. If it cannot be prevented it should be safeguarded by a provision forbidding its use for ordinary government expenditures.
