'Few Tory Accomplishments' Is Charge By Mike Pearson

NEWCASTLE, N.B. (CP) — National Liberal leader Lester Pearson said Saturday night that problems confronting the Progressive Conservative government are too often allowed to develop to the "crisis stage" before any attempt is made to deal with them.
He said in the last 2 1/2 years, the Conservatives had few accomplishments in spite of the confidence shown them by the Canadian people.
He said Canada's defence policy needed close examination. Present defence spending was little more than "a terrible waste." Defence Minister Peakes was continually making statements on defence policy but "none of his ideas seem too good."
Addressing a capacity crowd in this northern New Brunswick community while on a tour of the eastern and northern sections of the province, he said he believed Canada had no chance of defending her own soil alone.

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Distance Walking Mark Claimed By Red Woman

LONDON (AP) — A Russian-born woman doctor trudged into London from Birmingham Sunday night with her feet wrapped in rags and claimed a world long-distance walking record.
Dr. Barbara Moore, 56, the wife of English sculptor Harry Moore, said she covered the 110 miles in 27 hours and 30 minutes to break a record for the distance which already had been broken twice earlier in the day.
She carried her pet tortoise, Fungio, on the long lonesome journey. She said she ran 39 miles of the way.
"I think I would have done it in the 24 hours I planned if I had been wearing proper running shoes," she said. "As it was, I had to wrap my feet in sackings because they were swollen."
She said all the nourishment

she had on her march was a can of orange juice and a can of mixed vegetable juice.
The time claimed by Dr. Moore was 2 1/2 hours less than the mark of 30 hours flat set only a few hours earlier by a young airman who marched 110 miles from Norwich to London.
Dr. Moore's march capped a weekend which brought out at least 20 people to attempt long distance walks in Britain's latest and zaniest craze.
Tired feet plodding along the hard tarmac of Britain's roads signalled a painful renaissance in the order of human antics to which flag-pole sitting and goldfish swallowing belong.
ARBITRARY DISTANCE
Through Saturday night and

Sunday, 15 Britons marched toward distant objectives along the byways of England and Scotland and the steep valley roads of Wales. All aimed at putting up unbeatable times for 110 miles—an arbitrary distance whose origin has never become clear.
The craze to kill time in spectacular manner found other outlets: Two London students ran a cartload of manure from London to Oxford Saturday—a distance of 90 miles—and waited for challengers. The manure they laid respectfully around a tree Sir Winston Churchill planted in the university recently.
And in Bury St. Edmunds, sedate East Anglian town, 83 men and their girl friends claimed a world record by pack-

ing themselves into 84 square feet of space. The event took place in a pub called The Nutshell, the smallest pub in Britain.
TECHNICAL EDUCATION
OTTAWA (CP) — A "tremendous growth" in Canadian technical education was reported Monday by the bureau of statistics. Full-time enrolment in technical institutes has reached 8,304 for the current 1959-60 term, an increase of almost 83 per cent from 1954-55. Three provinces account for nearly all the full-time enrolment this term. Quebec leads with 56.5 per cent of the enrolment, Ontario follows with 32. per cent, and Albert has 7.8 per cent. Other provinces enrol the other 3.1 per cent.

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
