Price Index Up In June

OTTAWA (CP)—The consumer price index rose by one-tenth of a point in June to 116.2 from 116.1 in May. It was the second consecutive monthly increase in living costs. The jump, however, was less than the increase of three-fifths of a point in May, which was the biggest rise in 30 months. The index is based on 1949 prices equaling 100.

As in the previous month, the June advance was sparked by higher prices for some foods, as well as rents and home-ownership.

There were price advances in June for eggs, beef, lamb, fresh and canned fruits, potatoes, coal, cleaning supplies, paid household help and a number of hardware items. Rises also were noted for newspaper rates and local transportation fares.

These advances generally overbalanced declines for pork, lard, sugar and some fresh vegetables, as well as a few furniture items and appliances and nylon hosiery.

Cost-of-living advances in both May and June have been recorded for some years. The combined May-June 1954 increase of seven-tenths of a point compared with a combined 1953 rise of a full point. It is the total two-month rise was one-fifth of a point.

Bureau of Statistics officials said that the advent of summer seems to have some influence on increasing living costs, perhaps because the first fresh fruits and vegetables reaching the market are high-priced, reducing prices as the season continues and supplies become more plentiful.

The June index, at 116.2, is the highest since December, 1953. Since that time the cost-of-living yardstick had been shifting downward until the May-June price-upset the trend.

FOOD, RENT UP

In June, the food sub-group rose by one-fifth of a point to 121.1, the second consecutive rise and bringing the sub-group level back to where it was last January.

With both rents and home-ownership costs continuing to rise, the shelter column made an advance of one-fifth of a point to a new high of 125.6.

The household operations column also rose by a tenth of a point to 117.2.

CLOTHING CHEAPER

The clothing column declined by a tenth of a point to 109.6, reflecting lower prices for nylon hosiery.

Wholesale prices showed some strength in July. The industrial materials index, based on 1953-39 prices, equaling 100, edged ahead to 223.7 on July 23 from 223.6 on June 25.

A more spectacular gain was noted for the Canadian farm products index, based on 1935-39 prices, which rose to 215.8 on July 23 from 205.5 on June 25. The rise was due mainly to a sharp seasonal increase in potatoes as the new crop reached the market.

Savings On Deposit Show Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—Savings on deposit in Canada's chartered banks at June 30 amounted to \$5,422,000, against \$5,377,538,000 on May 31, and \$5,126,015,000 at June 30, 1953. The chartered bank statement for June showed Wednesday call loans in Canada amounted to \$238,458,000 at June 30 as against \$215,073,000 at May 31 and \$122,895,000 at June 30, 1953.

AGED RESCUER

LINDSAY (CP)—A 95-year-old fisherman rescuing two younger men from drowning here after the two fell into the swift waters of Gull river. Frank Cooper of Cobconk held out his fishing rod and, when the two grabbed hold, pulled them to shore. Mr. Cooper celebrated his birthday last week.

Montreal Stocks

MONTREAL (CP)—Stock market prices moved sharply lower in active trading Friday.

Aluminum dropped 2 1/2% at 68 1/2 while General Dynamics was off 66 and down 1 1/2 points. One-point losses were posted by Olinella and Ontario at 36 1/2, Noranda at 72 1/2 and Vickers at 27 1/2. CPR and Fraser were each 1/2 easier at 25 1/2 and 20 1/2, respectively.

Other lower issues were Asbestos Corporation, Powell River, National Steel Car, Abitibi, Canadian Breweries, Steico and Imperial Oil.

Canada Cement advanced two points at 129. St. Lawrence Corporation, Bell and Hudson Bay Mining were fractionally improved.

Utilities leaned forward narrowly while the remainder of the industrial market drifted into softer territory.

Mines slipped downward in a narrow range. Cassiar was off 25 cents at \$5.75. Western oils were quiet and trendless.

Canadian Dollar

MONTREAL (CP)—The U.S. dollar closed at a discount of 2 1/2 per cent in terms of Canadian funds Friday, up 3-32. It took 97 1/2 cents Canadian to buy \$1 American. Pound sterling \$2.73 9/16, up 3-16.

New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market sustained its second deepest decline of the year Friday, touched off by heavy liquidation of Chrysler Corp. shares.

Brokers said Chrysler Corp., which cut its quarterly dividend in 1954, was a major factor.
