

(Mr. W.) regretted he could not help thinking it was intended for a bribe, and as such, was eminently discredit-able to its promoters. We are advised by the member for Charlottetown (Mr. Palmer) to vote the increase, in order to secure the independence of the Governor. The hon. gentleman surely does not think so meanly of His Excellency as to suppose that he cannot be independent without it. Is not this paltry and contemptible excuse an insult to the honor of His Excellency? To secure his independence—to induce him to discharge his high and important duties with integrity and honour, we are called upon to vote him five hundred pounds!! Certainly, Sir Donald Campbell has very great reason to applaud his friends for the interest they manifest in his affairs! It is not the independence of the Governor those gentlemen seek to maintain—his dependence, his slavery to them and their partizans is the object they hope to achieve. Had His Excellency at once given any sign of a disposition to pursue the late policy of the late Govern-ment—to accomplish those measures of reform which he had so vigorously commenced—to prepare the Colony for that system of Government which has swept to the wild winds of heaven the abuses and pretensions of dominant Oligarchies in the neighbouring Colonies—not one of those who are now so zealous in their advocacy of this measure would be found to utter a syllable in its behalf. It had been urged by the Speaker that we ought to vote the increase, so as to conciliate the Home Government, and to prevent our being called upon to pay those public officers whose Salaries are now drawn from the Imperial Revenue. He (Mr. W.) was not anxious that the Colony should escape from the payment of its Civil List, if our unwillingness to pay it was to be held up to us by the Colonial Minister as a mark of our degradation, and as a reason for refusing to us those improvements in our local institutions which might enable us to keep pace with the surrounding Provinces. As a British subject he had felt ashamed of the reproach which the Secretary for the Colonies had repeatedly cast in our faces in reference to the payment of our Civil List; and he considered it to be the duty of the Legislature to strain every nerve, and husband every resource to provide for the payment of every department of our civil establishment. The Legislature—the Country—ought to be honest and independent enough to despise such an attempt at conciliation; and the Governor who would receive the appropriation now contemplated, on such a condition—who would quietly submit to the shameful attempt made to bribe himself and gag the Colonial Minister, would be undeserving of that character for independence—integrity of principle—and faithfulness in the discharge of his important functions, which he (Mr. W.) earnestly hoped the present Administrator of the Government was determined to maintain.

SUPREME COURT—PRINCE COUNTY.

The Supreme Court opened on Tuesday the 6th inst. when the following trials took place:—
 The Queen vs. Patrick O'Brien—Indictment for the murder of his wife—Party tried and acquitted
 The Queen vs. Joseph De Roche—Indictment for administering poison to his wife, with intent to kill—Tried and convicted—Sentenced to two years' imprisonment.
 The Queen vs. Ephraim Reid—Indictment for per-suading a Witness not to give evidence—Party tried and convicted—motion in arrest of judgment.
 The Queen vs. Mary Duffy—Larceny—Tried and convicted—sentenced to four Calendar Months' imprisonment.
 The Queen vs. Duncan M'Kendrick; Larceny; Tried and acquitted.
 The Queen vs. James Murphy; Larceny; Tried and acquitted.
 A Bill of Indictment was also found against Hector M'Lean, for Larceny; the Attorney General entered a *nolle prosequi*.
 Two Civil Causes were tried, and a number of Appeals disposed of.

FREE TRADE BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA.—We find the following in the New York Advertiser of the 19th inst. and most sincerely do we trust that the bill reported, may pass the Legislature; and that our 'collective wisdom' will lose no time in taking advantage of it. It may be seen that the articles named, with the single exception of salted meats and manufactured grain, all come under the head of 'raw materials.' Should this bill pass, and should we adopt the wise and enlightened principles on which it is based, every interest in Canada will be benefitted thereby.—*Canada paper.*

The following is a copy of a bill reported by Mr. Grinnell, from the committee on commerce, of the House of Representatives, on the 4th instant, read twice, and referred to the whole.

A BILL to admit certain articles of the growth or production of Canada into the United States free of duty, upon the condition that the like articles of the growth or production of the United States are admitted into Canada free of duty.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that when the President of the United States shall issue his proclamation that the articles hereinafter enumerated, being of the growth or production of the United States, are admitted into the Province of Canada by law

free of duty; that on and after that day, the like articles, being the growth or production of said Province of Canada, shall be admitted into the United States free of duty, when imported direct from said Province, so long as the said enumerated articles are admitted into said Province of Canada from the United States free of duty, unless otherwise directed by Congress, to wit: Grain and breadstuffs of all kinds, vegetables, fruits, animals, hides, wool, tallow, horns, salted and fresh meats, ores of all kinds of metal, timber, staves, wood and lumber of all kinds.
