HALIFAX (CP) — Dick (Kid) Davis, usually an in-fighter, was outgunned by Howard on the inside throughout the fight. But the last three rounds saw Davis forcing the fight with Howard back-peddaling and counter-punching.

The referee and one judge scored it 4-3 for Howard. The other judge gave Davis a 97-90 edge on points, scoring the rounds 4-2.

The Canadian Press scorecard read 4-2-3.

Howard, scheduled to fight Willie Towell in South Africa for the British Empire lightweight crown, said "the fight he felt ready to meet the best."

Davis showed welts under the eyes.

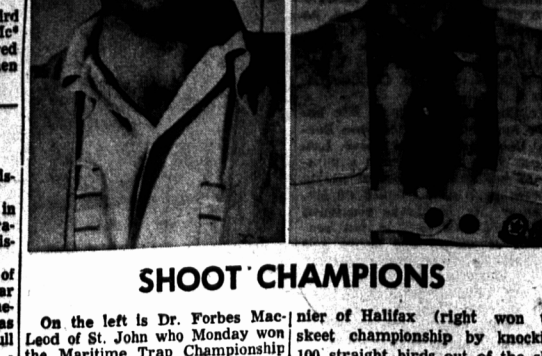

List Of Injuries Dampens Rough Riders' Elation

OTTAWA (CP)—The elation felt by Ottawa Rough Riders after their highly respectable showing against Montreal Alouettes Monday couldn't be enjoyed as fully as it might have been. The Big Four Football Union club had too many injuries to think about.

But coach Frank Clair, not one to get carried away, did have some warm words for his charges after they fought to a 22-20 loss in Montreal.

"They'll make mistakes," Clair told his players, "but they're fighters. They kept fighting even when inexperience on the part of some of our newcomers hurt our chances."

As for Hal Patterson, Montreal end who did such a tremendous

job against the Riders, Clair said: "What are you supposed to do with a man like Patterson? Guess you'd have to shoot him to stop him."

IMPORT TACKLE OUT

Weather Conditions Force Cancellation Of Swim Attempt

Weather conditions on Sunday morning forced Davison Biggar to abandon an attempted swim of Northumberland Strait, and return to Summerside where he has spent the summer as a swimming instructor of Y's Mens sponsored swimming classes.

In a motor boat operated by Hazel MacWilliams, of Cape Traverse, and accompanied by his father, Stan Biggar, and brother Ernest, of Charlottetown, the swimmer sailed from the Island at 2:30 a.m., intending to start the swim from the New Brunswick shore, however a strong breeze and rough water forced the party to abandon plans for the swim attempt and return to port. Water temperature was 62 degrees.

Because tides are becoming increasingly unfavorable to the swim, Mr. Biggar is uncertain as to whether he will attempt the swim this year.

Only two persons are known to have conquered this body of water, 9 to 10 miles wide, at its narrowest point, and made longer in swimming distance because of the strong tidal waters in the strait.

Both conquerors of the swim have been women, the first being Evelyn Henry of Charlottetown, while Mrs. Dorothy Peters of Summerside was successful in swimming the strait just one year ago.
