A GENERAL MEETING of the Dominion Temperance Alliance was held on Saturday evening. The committee appointed to confer with the City Council and the Stipendiary Magistrate concerning the better enforcement of the Scott Act, made their report, and much satisfaction was expressed at the decisive action taken in the matter by the Stipendiary Magistrate. A committee was appointed to arrange for holding a public Temperance meeting to be addressed by leading workers from all parts of the Island; and a hearty vote of thanks was tendered THE EXAMINER for the independent stand taken by it in the cause of temperance.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning, two young men who were drunk and disorderly on Queen Street, yesterday evening, were each fined \$8 or 30 days. The Scott Act cases of Mrs. Offr, J. J. Trainor and H. B. Smith were postponed for one week, and that of Charles Harvey was dismissed, Mr F. Peters, who appeared as counsel for the defendants in the Scott Act cases, directed the attention of the Magistrate to the clauses in the Act which provided that defendants in these suits have the right to appear by counsel, and also that in the event of the prosecution failing to sustain the charges made, the Magistrate, in giving judgment, shall direct that all costs be paid by the prosecutor. His Honor promised to look into the matter.

A Murderer at Bay.

OMAHA, Neb., March 21. A prominent farmer in Burt County yesterday discharged Johnson, alias Anderson. The latter picked a quarrel with the farmer and shot him dead. He then secured a Winchester rifle and a quantity of ammunition, mounted a horse and made off. The constable organized a posse and gave pursuit. The murderer opened fire and shot Peter Johnson dead, his brother Charles fatally, and killed and maimed a number of horses. He finally took refuge in a barn, and defended himself all night and to-day. Reinforcements have been sent for.

Fishery Resolutions.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 21. It is expected that Senator Edmunds' resolutions on report of Judiciary Committee, based on the refusal of the Executive to furnish certain papers which the majority of the Senate consider to be public property, but which the President firmly holds to be personal and private, will be voted upon this week. Senator Frye will then make an attempt to bring up the fishery resolutions. He hopes to secure an opportunity for debate on Wednesday or Thursday.

Toronto News.

TORONTO, March 21. Toronto is threatened with a strike, which will have the effect of paralyzing other trades. The lathers yesterday decided not to resume work to-morrow (owing to refusal of employers to grant them an advance of 25 cts. per day. Joe Elliot, a notorious forger now under arrest in New York, has been fully identified as Walter Gardiner, who swindled banks here in 1883 out of \$15,000 by means of forged drafts.

Steamer Ashore.

WASHINGTON, March 21. The United States Signal Corps, stationed at Smithville, N. C., reports an unknown steamer, schooner rigged, ashore on Erying Pan Shoals, about eight miles off Cape Fear, but the sea was too rough to establish communication with her. She is probably British, and is lying easy.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, March 21. Great interest centres in Hon. Mr. Thompson's speech to-morrow in answer to Mr. Blake. The press dinner here last night was a great success. Toasts were given in honor of the "Tories," "Grits," "Third Party," "Bolters," and "Our Country."

More Strikers.

BRUSSELS, March 21. The strike among the coal miners is spreading. The strikers are determined and are using intimidation of all kinds, even force, to prevent the non-strikers from working. Troops are protecting the mines.

A Bank Defaulter.

OMAHA, Neb., March 21. Hon. Charles P. Mathewson, President of the Norfolk National Bank, of Norfolk, has fled for parts unknown. His wife received a letter from him saying he was ruined and did not dare face his creditors.

High Water.

PICKERING, Ont., March 21. Owing to recent heavy rains the water rose twelve feet above high water mark, causing great damage. People had to be rescued from their houses on flats.

Another Fire.

HELENA, Ark., March 21. A fire this morning destroyed several business houses and three large blocks and the opera house. Loss about \$300,000; insurance about \$175,000.

Shipping Disaster.

LONDON, March 21. The German schooner Rosalie has been wrecked on the coast of Cork, Ireland. The Captain died and the crew suffered terribly from exposure.

Collapse of a Quarry.

PARIS, March 21. A number of persons were entombed by the collapse of a quarry at Berges, in the south of France, to-day. The bodies were recovered.

Fire.

NEWBURYPORT, Mass., March 21. This morning two shoe factories and two large tenements were destroyed by fire. Loss \$80,000; insurance about \$54,000.

Killed by Lightning.

BOWMANVILLE, Ont., March 21. A. Blowth, a farmer, was killed by lightning yesterday morning.
