

Very Latest Despatches.

Madrid, Oct. 6. The Provisional Junta has requested Marshal Serrano to take charge of affairs until the meeting of the Cortes, and has consented to act with Gen. Prim, and O'Connell as his colleagues.

It is daily becoming more evident that the great majority of the people are in favor of a Republic form of Government in Spain. The Cortes of Victoria and Count Clesha have declared that they will support the existing Provisional Junta.

London, Oct. 7, evening. It is said that the committee appointed by the House of Commons on the subject of the land laws in Ireland, will report to the next session at an early day, and that the Ministry will bring in a bill to amend the law.

Madrid, Oct. 7. The Provisional Junta has been organized. Serrano and Prim are the members. The Junta has sent its address to the Provisional Junta.

New York, Oct. 8. The reported fight between the whites and negroes in Opelousas, Louisiana, was greatly exaggerated. It is now ascertained that only two whites were killed and eight wounded.

Liverpool, Oct. 8, evening. Advice from Rio Janeiro mentions a rumor that President Lopez had been defeated by the Allies and obliged to retire from his position at San Juan.

New York, Oct. 8. A Havana letter states that several cases of cholera had occurred in the suburbs. The excitement for news from Spain was intense, nothing being allowed relative thereto to be transmitted west of the Cuban cable.

Glasgow, Oct. 8. The Prince of Wales today laid the corner stone of the new University in this city. The Princess of Wales and a number of distinguished persons were present on the platform.

Madrid, Oct. 8. The Provisional Junta has issued a decree regarding by one third the tariff on all imports. Don Juan, a favorite of Queen Isabella, has resigned his position to a throne of Spain in favor of his son, Don Carlos.

Springfield, Mass., Oct. 8. The National Convention of French Canadians in the United States today adopted resolutions in condemnation of the British American Government and the movement on the part of the Canadian Government to coerce Nova Scotia into it.

London, Oct. 8. Rumors are current at Paris and Madrid that Cuba has declared for Independence. The Spanish Junta will bring a bill before the Cortes for abolishing slavery in the Colonies at the expiration of ten years.
