Mass Meeting Scheduled Tonight To Protest New Liquor Store Plan

SUMMERSIDE — A special mass meeting of the 19 school districts of Athena Regional High School has been called for 9:30 tonight, it was learned late last night.

A seven-man committee of ratepayers, headed by Earl Cannon, chairman of the Athena Regional High School Board, was instrumental in calling the meeting following a story in a Summerside paper stating that members of the P.E.I. Liquor Commission had made an official decision yesterday to continue with the construction of the liquor store on Granville Street North.

The committee opposes the site of the store because of its nearness to schools and a sport complex.

All ratepayers from the surrounding area have been invited to the meeting to express views either pro or con.

Also invited and requested to give a stand on the issue are P.E.I. Liquor Control Board, Sherbrooke Community Improvement Committee, the provincial director of town planning and the town planning committee, the premier and his cabinet, Summerside Town Council and the Summerside Board of Trade.
