Co-Op Executive Suggests Members' Buying Contracts

MONCTON (Special) — Dr. Alex Laidlaw, executive secretary of the Co-operative Union of Canada, recommended at the annual meeting of Maritime Co-operative Services in Moncton that every local member co-operative of Maritime Co-operative Services should be under a purchasing contract with its regional co-operative wholesaler.

This would guarantee a greater volume of business to Maritime co-operative services, giving it greater strength in its negotiation of prices with suppliers, he said.

At present local co-operatives are under no obligation to purchase all or any of their goods from their regional cooperative wholesaler.

Dr. Laidlaw also recommended that every local member co-operative should be under management contract with Maritime Co-operative Services giving it the option of choosing and supervising the management of local co-operatives.

At present there are 17 local co-operatives in the Maritimes with Maritime Co-operative Services, but most local co-operatives have no such contract. The third recommendation by the executive secretary of the Co-operative Union of Canada was that Maritime Co-operative Services should be given the authority to operate local retail operations in its own name.

He pointed to the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool as a successful co-operative organization which operates as a total complete system, and not as an association of dozens of autonomous groups.

Dr. Laidlaw feels that a similar type of integration is necessary among cooperative in the Maritimes, if they hope to continue to meet the competition from large integrated private profit businesses.

At yesterday's annual meeting sessions the delegates present voted unanimously for their board of directors to make a thorough study of Dr. Laidlaw's proposals for integration of the Maritime cooperative movement.

Magistrate James Johnston, QC, presided.

James Aloysius Sullivan, Vernon Bridge, charged with operating a motor vehicle powered by marked gas also had his case adjourned to Jan. 11, at 2 p.m. for trial.

One accused charged with illegal possession of liquor was fined \$50 and costs of 40 days. Two others were fined \$20 and costs of 30 days.

P.E.I. Population Rises By 1,287

CAPITAL-BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — Number of marriages in Prince Edward Island has increased 7.2 per cent this year as compared to 1964, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports in its latest monthly bulletin.

For the first 10 months of this year marriages number 581 compared to 545 for the same period in 1964. In October alone, the number of marriages declined to 54 from 67 in October 1964.

The P.E.I. birth rate is down this year from last with 2,116 births recorded to the end of October compared to 2,239 last year — a drop of 8 per cent.

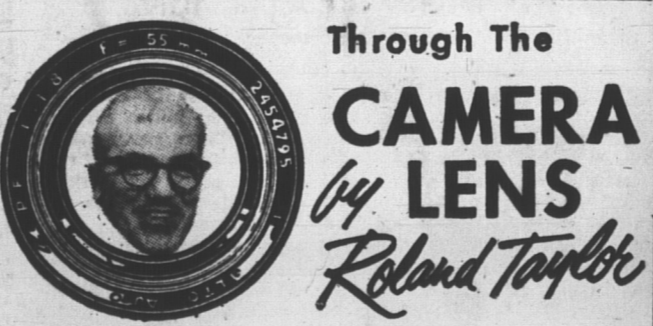
