

Pope Motor Aces Upset S' side Junior Legionnaires

SUMMERSIDE — Pope Motor Aces showed a complete reversal of form last night from their two previous outings in the young Prince County Hockey League season as they whipped the previously undefeated Junior Legionnaires 6-2.

Despite the lopsided score, the tilt was an exciting one with the two teams skating furiously throughout the 60 minutes. There were some sloppy plays but these were offset by the fast pace of the game.

The Aces also boosted their lineup for last night's game and their biggest asset was

Charlottetown native Donnie Frizel between the pipes. Frizel, who served his senior hockey apprenticeship in the Island Hockey League and also saw some action in the Maritime Hockey League, was outstanding in the nets, kicking out some terrific shots time and time again.

Two other additions to the Aces lineup were "Diddies" Doyle and George Driscoll, who had seen action in the Prince County League other seasons with Borden Nationals.

The top point-getter, however, was George Dalton, who last year toiled with the Juniors. Dalton triggered a pair of goals behind Legionnaire eager George MacNeill and assisted on another one.

The other markers for the Aces were scored by Bobby Perry, W.

Grant, Greg Deighan and Leroy Clow.

Going into the final 20 minutes of play the Aces were leading 6-0 but in this final stanza the Juniors managed to dent the twines with Donnie Arsenault and Ivan Bagiole being the trigger-men.

The officials were kept busy throughout the contest with a total of 19 penalties being called, including four majors and two 10-minute misconducts.

The majors and misconducts were evenly divided between George Smith of the Juniors and Dave Gaudet of the Aces. Smith and Gaudet mixed it up for the first time in the sandwich session and the third period wasn't five minutes old when they tangled again, receiving a major and an automatic 10-minute misconduct.

Well, it's the second biggest day in the year as far as four Canadian football league clubs are concerned and at least one of the four coaches quite possibly has his job on the line.

In the East the hungry Ottawa Roughriders will travel to the unfriendly confines of Civic Stadium in Hamilton where they will have to overcome a 5 point deficit in order to advance to the Grey Cup classic, and the hopes of thousands of fans across the country shall certainly be going with them.

This is a do or die effort for Frank Clair and his charges for should they lose Sunday's game there is a glaring possibility that Clair's job will go along with the match. The Riders have been in the finals consistently for the past few seasons but always it seems as if they blow their chance to advance against the Western division champs. Last season they carried a 17 point lead into the second game of the total point series but managed to lose by a point.

The Riders have a much better balanced club than the Ti-Cats in that they have one of the most explosive offenses in Canada. Russ Jackson, Bo Scott, and Jim Dillard give the Riders a backfield second to none and a young club (average age is 24), always has a few more gasps of breath to fall back on.

However with much youth in the lineup there have been a lot of mistakes and as the old saying goes 'The team that makes the least number of mistakes usually wins'. The Ottawa defense is certainly not as strong as the Tiger Cats but it does not have to be for the Hamilton club does not have to much in the way of an offense.

This is the main beef against Hamilton advancing to the Grey Cup. Who wants to see a dreary defensive low scoring battle that is the style of the Cats? Either of the two clubs that come from the West are capable of trouncing Hamilton, but the Riders with their tremendous ability to break loose on any one play would make for a wide open brand of play.

Ottawa almost certainly lost last week's match on the basis of some horrendous refereeing but enough has already been said about that in the past week. They need only to win by an unconverted touchdown to take the marbles in the east and with the club up as it is, it is quite likely that they will do just that.

The best thing that Calgary coach Jerry Williams going for him is that he didn't join the coaching until 1964 and therefore missed two of the most gruesome events ever to happen to a football club. Saint Dunstan's Varsity hockey team begin the defense of their Maritime Intercollegiate hockey title this afternoon as the league gets underway again. The Saints looked neither strong nor weak in their two exhibition matches against Prince of Wales but they should hustle to their first win of the season this afternoon. The game at the SDU rink will begin at 2:00.

Bernie Faloney, Montreal Alouettes' start quarterback, said Friday he will be returning for the Eastern Football Conference club's 1966 season. Faloney, who came here from Hamilton Tiger-Cats in an off-season trade, denied reports that the removal of Jim Trimble as Als head coach will alter his status with the team. "I signed a three-year contract with the club, not with Jim Trimble," Faloney said. Asked to comment on Trimble's release Thursday, Faloney said he felt the former head coach had "been on the brink" of giving Montrealers a winning football club. Faloney and Trimble were associated during the latter's seven-year coaching stint at Hamilton. The Montreal quarterback is currently awaiting a hospital bed to be made available so he can undergo knee surgery.

Alberta's only director of the Canadian Olympic Association said Friday he will oppose endorsement of a bid by Montreal for the 1972 summer Olympic Games. Peter Lougheed, also first vice-president of the Olympic '72 group backing Alberta's Banff-lake Louise site for the 1972 winter Olympic Games, said he will oppose the Montreal bid at a CCA meeting in Toronto today. The Montreal bid was announced Monday by Mayor Jean Drapeau of Montreal. Mr. Lougheed said he would like to see the summer Olympic Games held in Canada at some future time. Mr. Lougheed, Olympic '72 manager Hans Maciej and E. J. Davis, president of the local Olympic group, will attend the Toronto meeting.

Perry Moss, head coach of Charleston Rockets of the Continental Football League, and predecessor to Jim Trimble as head coach of Montreal Alouettes, sees no advantage in the Montreal decision to seek a new head coach. Moss, who guided the Eastern Football Conference club's destiny for three years, was commenting Friday on Trimble's Thursday dismissal in a telephone interview with Montreal radio station CJAD. "No I don't think so," Moss said, when asked if Trimble's departure will help the club. "The only way to get a winner there is to start out and continue with an individual who understands the Canadian game." Moss said such a coach should be given "five years to do the job and give him full responsibility... it takes that long to build a winner."
