How different it was with the members of the government and their supporters! They were in number as seven to one, compared with their open opponents in the House. They set out to make the most of this advantage. They would talk and talk, their speeches would be printed in their own organ and the Opposition papers alike—seven speeches to one—what a splendid chance to get their party propaganda before the electors! So they went to it, with speeches of mutual admiration and laudation of the Bell Government. Measuring themselves by themselves they thought to themselves that they were great men and that wisdom would perish from the earth when they passed off the stage. Then it came to pass that one by one these "boy balloons" were punctured and these windbags collapsed by a quick return in debate, or an exposure in the press and then they were in trouble!

Then began the endless caucusing. And at first almost every caucus was a noisy quarrel. A faction tried hard to depose the Premier. They even talked openly of it in the House, where his obituary was pronounced. To any one they met the kickers frankly stated that he was no good, the party would never get anywhere or accomplish anything until they got a new leader. But they could not agree upon any one to lead in his place. Every kicker thought himself qualified to lead, but not one of the aspirants could command a single vote except his own. So Premier Bell remained at his post, on sufferance, after being insulted in the caucus and in the House. The open quarrels among members of the government were notorious. So were their violent abuse of each other and their refusal to sit beside each other in their appointed seats.

So matters went on, one or more members of the government openly opposing in the House measures before agreed upon in caucus and openly reminded of the fact by a colleague. Politically it was confusion worse confounded, an undisciplined mob and sometimes "a nest of traitors," at least traitors to the leader posing as a government. Despondency was marked from day to day on the faces of more than one of the port folio members. Stung by Opposition criticism in the House and in the press, Commissioner Lea raised the cry of persecution. They were being hounded down, "attacked by a pack of wolves," as he put it! Oh, ye gods and little fishes! In a House of twenty supporters, opposed by three—seven to one in numbers, and yet persecuted! Who but an imbecile would blubber over such persecution as that?

These are some of the things that the supporters of the Bell Government and the members of the Government will have to talk over with the electors during the recess. And other things as well. There is the matter of the Dalton Sanatorium and the shabby treatment extended to its generous donor. And there is the farmers' mussel mud cut off with nothing but taxation instead of fertilizer to take its place. And there is the dirty Salary Grab perpetrated while not a dollar can be spared toward erecting a monument to our brave soldiers—four years after they gave up their lives! And there are our Western land claims and nothing done to press them after three years in power, and the lands now being parcelled out among the Prairie Provinces! Is not such incompetence utterly sickening?—Yes, the Bell Government and its supporters will have some things to talk over with their constituents between now and the day of the by-elections. And the electors will have something to say also. Who will envy the deceivers when the talk takes place?
