Referring to the teacher shortage situation, he said, the shortage in the United States is no worse than in Canada. The state with the highest standard has the lowest teacher shortage.

**DIFFICULT JOB**

Dr. Lazerte went on to say that teaching is the most difficult of the professional jobs but added that the status of the teacher was lowered each year because certificates were given to unqualified teachers.

Unqualified teachers should never be given certificates. They should merely be permitted to teach until such time as qualified teachers could be obtained.

"Canada as a whole tends to be a little too self-satisfied with its system of education. The amount of money spent on education is relatively small. It is equal to only 8.3 per cent of the money collected from the public by federal, provincial and municipal governments combined," Dr. Lazerte stated.

**Statement Is Likely Soon**

SUMMERSIDE — Robert W. Betton, Lot 16, Island representative of the Civil Service Federation of Canada said today he will make a public statement soon in regards to the government's refusal to grant an anticipated salary increase.

Mr. Betton said "Naturally we are disappointed — we were assured that the raise in pay was merited and we expected to get it." He added that any full statement on the situation as it affects civil servants locally will have to wait until he has had a chance to confer with federation officers in Ottawa.

Mr. Betton, who is also president of the National Defence Employees Association for the province, said there is no possibility of a strike to enforce their demands for increases.

"We do not believe in strikes," he said pointing out that the federation relies on negotiations to secure benefits which it considers merited.

In his capacity as provincial representative of the Civil Service Federation, Mr. Betton represents more than 600 employees of the federal government.

## Prince Co. Roads To Be Gravelled

Contracts have been awarded for the applying of gravel or sandstone to 16.6 miles of Prince County roads, it was stated yesterday by Hon. J. Philip Matheson, minister of highways.

Only one stretch of road, nine-tenths of a mile, is scheduled to receive sandstone. It is at Darnley Shore. All others will get gravel.

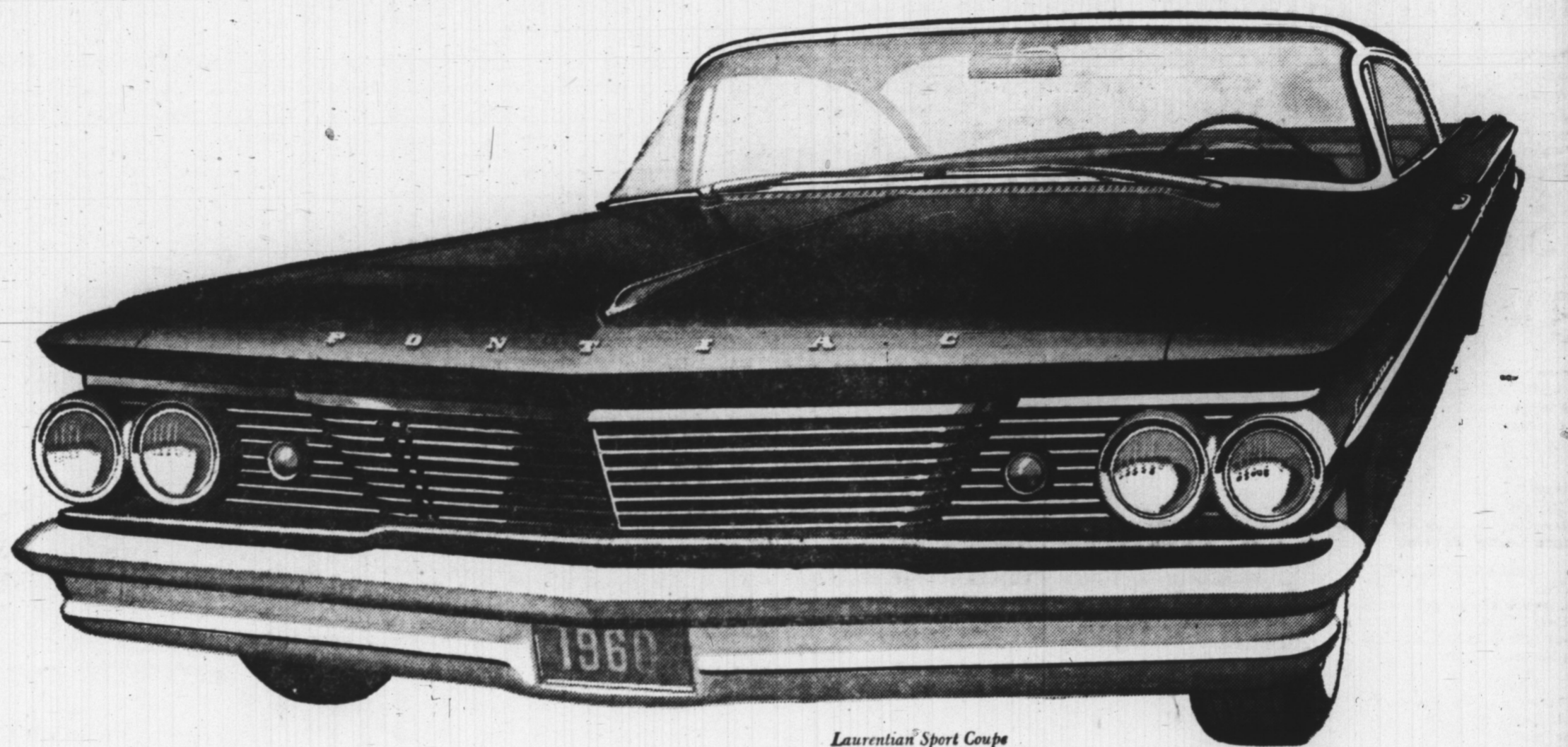

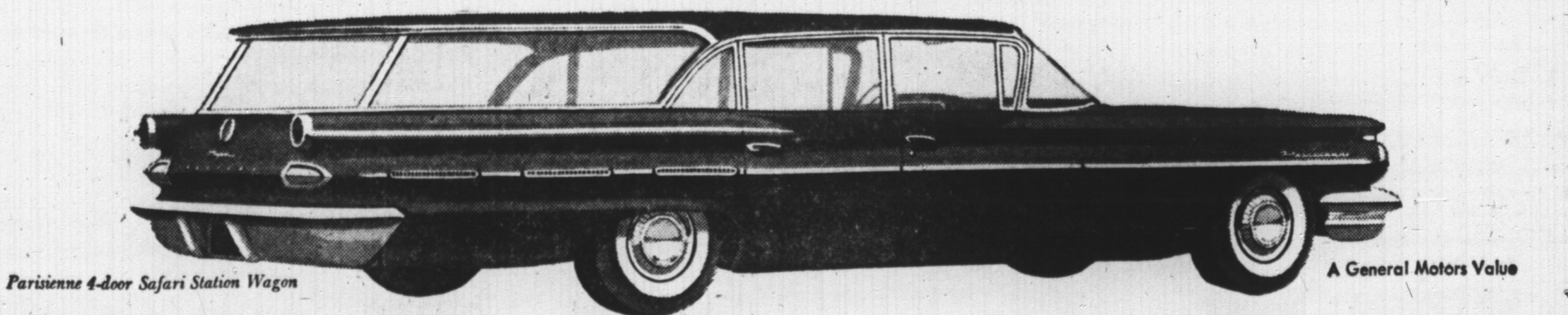
