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Speech By Browne Is Questioned By CCF House Leader In House

OTTAWA (CP) — A speech here Tuesday night by William J. Browne, Newfoundland's representative in the federal cabinet, served as the basis of two questions of privilege raised in the Commons Wednesdays by CCF House leader Hazen Argue.

The questions of privilege, both dealing with remarks attributed to Mr. Browne by the Ottawa Citizen, were rejected by Speaker Roland Michener as not affecting the rights of the House or its members.

Mr. Argue submitted first that there was conflict between what Mr. Browne had been quoted as saying to a meeting of the Ottawa district Young Progressive Conservatives and what Prime Minister Diefenbaker had said earlier in the Commons on the same subject.

The minister without portfolio was quoted as saying that the government-formed union replacing the decertified International Woodworkers of America (IWA) in Newfoundland seems to be working out well and that other government-formed unions have performed well.

Mr. Argue then quoted the prime minister's remarks in the Commons March 10 in which Mr. Diefenbaker said that the cabinet is considering the whole question of disallowance of the provincial legislation that decertified the woodworkers.

Mr. Diefenbaker interjected that any observation by a member of the cabinet has nothing to do with the question of allowance or disallowance and Mr. Michener agreed that he could see no question of privilege.

On the second point, Mr. Argue referred to a Commons exchange a few days ago in which the opposition sought to learn whether Mr. Browne had received any "communications" about the federal government's action in refusing to send RCMP reinforcement to Newfoundland.

If so, the opposition asked, what was their nature? But the speaker ruled at the time that the question could not be asked of a minister who had no responsibility for the subject under discussion, that it should be asked of the minister responsible and that Mr. Browne could not be required to table private correspondence.

Mr. Argue said Wednesday that Mr. Browne had disclosed in his Tuesday speech that he had written a letter to Newfoundland's municipal affairs minister. This had asked the provincial minister to appoint two conservative nominees to the St. John's Housing Authority.

Mr. Argue said that if a fed-

eral minister writes to a provincial government, that letter should be tabled in the Commons on request.

Mr. Michener said there appeared to be no difficulty in that — the point in his previous ruling was that personal correspondence need not be tabled. He

had no question of privilege involved.

Mr. Browne was in the Commons when the questions of privilege were raised but he made no comment. He appeared about to rise on the first question but was restrained by Postmaster-General William Hamilton, his seat mate.
