**For Business Men**

**Good Bookkeeping and Poor Book-keeping.**

The bookkeeping of a business is its historical record, writes Walton Day in an exchange. The record, to be of real value, must not only be correct in details, but must also be scientific in arrangement. The foundation upon which bookkeeping rests is the science of accounts. Scientific bookkeeping, therefore is the only kind of book-keeping which the progressive business man can tolerate. Bookkeeping, as an art, may be defined as the practical application of the principles of account to the records of business. Whatever methods embody the correct application of these principles, constitute good bookkeeping. On the other hand, those methods which neglect or violate the principles of accounts, serve to illustrate poor or inadequate bookkeeping.

**Dead Stock**

How much does dead stock add to your expense account? asks American Grocer. It is like interest, in that it works day and night, Sundays included. It ties up capital, and thus curtails purchasing power, besides robbing you of all chances to buy bargains, taking discounts, and keeping your credit at the top notch. If there is \$50 worth of dead stock on your shelves, every month adds interest and insurance to the cost, to say nothing of loss through depreciation in quality and injury in appearance. It is better to get rid of unsalable floods at a loss and place the money where it can be turned over quickly and often than to let it lie in stock, because you trust at some unknown period in the future you may sell the goods at a profit.

**Prices.**

Prices tell; they tell the reader what the goods will cost him, and that is the first essential. They tell the public that you are not afraid to have your prices compared with those of a competitor; they tell a competitor that you are in business for a purpose, and that purpose is to do business on a business basis.—Brookline Mass Chronicle.

An exchange says: A man who does not advertise simply because his grandfather did not, ought to wear knee pants and a queue. The man who does not advertise because it costs money should quit paying rent for the same reason. **SHOT HERSELF.**

**Because She Thought a Phantom Was Pursuing Her.**

BALTIMORE, Md., Jan. 15.—Miss Anna Mary Hoke Schley, 25 years of age, daughter of the late Col. Wm. Louis Schley, poet, lawyer and veteran of two wars, and cousin of Rear Admiral Schley, committed suicide to-day in her home here. Since the death of her father, to whom she was much attached, just a month ago to-day, Miss Schley had been inconsolable. A week ago her mental condition became alarming to her friends, and attendants were almost constantly at her bedside. This afternoon her sister, who had been chatting with her, went to her room for a few minutes, and when she returned Miss Schley was lying on her bed with a bullet hole in her left breast. She had shot herself through the heart with one of her father's revolvers. Two letters which she had written to friends indicate that she labored under the hallucination that she and her family was being pursued by some phantom.

**REV. JOHN DESOYRES**

**Will Be Asked to Become Rector of St. James', Toronto.**

TORONTO, Jan. 14.—Rev John Desoyres, M. A., rector of Stone Church, St. John, N. B., will, in all likelihood, be asked to become rector of St. James' Cathedral in succession to the late Bishop Sullivan. The lay delegates and church-wardens had not had a meeting yet to consider the choice of a new rector, but it is almost certain that the bishop of Toronto, on the advice of the congregation, will appoint the Rev Mr Desoyres. A meeting of the church-wardens and lay delegates of the cathedral will be held early next week, when action will be taken.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "Countess Rosemont de Rouge Aix, daughter of Mr. Stewart, the Boston millionaire, has been living in this city incognito, as a governess in a gentleman's house. It appears that only within a few minutes after her wedding, she learned by chance that the count had only married her because her father had promised to pay his debt, amounting to £306,000 (\$1,500,000). Overcome by this disclosure she ran away as a protest against being sold in this way and she intends earning her living here until she can divorce her mercenary husband."
