## Local and Other Items.

THE WEATHER.—Mod. rate to fresh northwest to southwest winds, fine and mild.

MUD.—The mud on King St., has overflowed the crossing leading from the Merchant's Bank to Mellich's corner, making it extremely disagreeable for persons travelling along Great George Street.

CITY OF GHENT.—The steamer City of Ghent arrived this afternoon about one o'clock. She left Hawkesbury for Charlottetown on Wednesday but had to put back on account of bad weather, riding out the storm off Cape George.

THE PICTOU BOAT.—The midnight train did not reach Picton until half-past two this morning, and there was a consequent delay in the departure of the Princess for Charlottetown. It was 7.45 before the steamer arrived, and she left on return as soon as possible afterwards.

FROM DEMERARA.—Schr. Brudenell, King, arrived at Halifax on Friday, 24 December, with cargo for Messrs George P. Mitchell & Sons, from Demerara, having weathered the fierce storms of the past week without any damage. Capt King reports great disasters to shipping.

COMMITTED TO THE EARTH.—The funeral of the late George Doyle took place this morning and was well attended. The pallbearers were Daniel McKinnon, L. B. MacMillan, Frank Blake, William Moran, Ernest Stanley and Wallace McLeod. The services in the Cathedral and at the grave were conducted by Rev. P. D. McGuigan.

EPISCOPAL MISSION.—Bishop Courtney concluded a series of mission addresses and sermons in this city by a splendid sermon, last evening, in St. Paul's Church. These discourses were heard by crowds of people, and it is hoped that the mission will result in lasting good. The Bishop left this morning for Summerside. He will hold a confirmation service at St. Eleanor's on Sunday morning and at Summerside on Sunday afternoon. On Monday he will hold a service at Kensington, and on Monday evening he will return to Charlottetown and leave the following day for Halifax. The Bishop is regarded by many persons as the greatest preacher of the Gospel who has visited Prince Edward Island.

NEXT Sunday and Monday, Charlottetown is to be honored by a visit from a famous woman, Miss Bird, of London, England. Miss Bird is a relative of the famous traveller, Mrs. Isabella Bird Bishop, and has been for some years a missionary in the east. She is not coming to collect money, but the Church Missionary Society, the largest missionary society in the world, consider her ability so great, that they have decided to send her to Canada to awaken a greater interest in the cause of missions. She is a wonderful speaker and such as it is not often our privilege to bear, and may be heard in St. Paul's Schoolroom next Sunday at 3.30 p. m. to which all children are invited. A meeting of women in the schoolroom on Sunday at 4 p. m. And a public missionary meeting in the same place at 7.30 p. m. on Monday.

THE STORM.—During the late storm, according to the Summerside Journal, Macrae's bridge, Flat River, and the bridge at Clifton, were damaged. At Alberton the schooners Black Watch, Perry, and Macbeath, Maokay, were left high and dry in the fields by the tide, which has not been so high, it is said, since 1851. A three-masted schooner which was under charter to load for Mr. Benj. Rogers, for the West Indies, was driven ashore and it is reported that she is a wreck. Two spans of the Grand River bridge, Lot 14, were swept away, most of the material being carried up the river and deposited in Mr. J. L. Goodwin's field near Wellington bridge. The South-west bridge, only a short distance from the Grand River bridge, was swept away and Lot 16 wharf is also reported as having been destroyed. The Malpeque breakwater was also injured, and it is said that the timber belonging to it is strewn along the shores of Richmond Bay. At Locke's Shore, St. Eleanor's Shore, and in fact all along the shore of Richmond bay much damage was done. Fish houses were swept into the fields, and many of the buildings completely destroyed. The same is the case with the oyster boats many of which are broken into kindling, wood, while others were carried by the tide into fields and mashes some distance from the shore. The damage will fall heavily on the oyster fishermen.
