

# Miami Amateur Winner Of Canadian Open Golf Title

 POINTE CLAIRE, Que. (CP)—  
 Doug Sanders, 22-year-old amateur from Miami Beach, Fla., Sunday won the Canadian Open golf championship in a playoff with Finsterwald of Bedford Heights, Ohio, fourth among the money winners on the pro circuit.

It was an unprecedented victory—the first time an amateur has won the Canadian Open.

The sudden-death playoff ended on the first hole the young insurance salesman and the pro golfer played. The extra play was started at the 18th hole of the Beacorsfield course.

Each finished the 72-hole tournament with medal scores of 273, a figure 15 strokes under par for the distance. Marty Furgol of Leont, Ill., was next with 274.

The 16th where the sudden-death play started, is a 420-yarder and Sanders took it with a par four.

Finsterwald sliced his drive to the 12th hole and Sanders took his second putt down the middle and hit the green with his second shot, 25 feet from the pin.

Finsterwald put his third in a trap to the right of the green,

chipped on six feet from the cup and sank his putt for his five.

Sanders won the tournament when he two-putted for his four.

Despite his failure to win the title and the Seagram Gold Cup, Finsterwald takes top prize money of \$2,400. Furgol collects \$1,800. Amateur Sanders will go home with only the cup.

Dick Mayer of St. Petersburg, Fla., who blew his chances to win on the last nine, took third prize money of \$1,400 with his 276 total. Mayer shot a par 72 on his final round.

**MISSED WINNING PUTT**  
 Finsterwald was leading the field after three rounds with 203 and Sanders was two strokes away at 205. Finsterwald shot a 70, missing a putt of about five feet at the 18th hole that would have given him the championship.

Sanders came through with a 68, shooting a three-under-par 33 on the back nine and finishing off the round with a birdie at the home hole.

Finsterwald's prize money moves him into second place among the money winners on the pro circuit. His win Sunday brings his total to more than \$20,000 and

puts him behind Dr. Cary Middlecoff and ahead of Gene Littler of Singing Hills, Calif., and Ted Kroil of Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Middlecoff, not in this tournament, has won \$23,300.

Littler shot a 70 to finish with 279, tied with Mike Fetchick of Mahopac, N.Y., and one stroke away from Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Texas, who shot a 69 for 278.

Arnold Palmer of Latrobe, Pa., who won the 1955 championship at Toronto, Ontario, had a last-round 68 for 280, tied with Bo Wingger of Odessa, Texas. Wingger, first-round leader with a course-equaling record 65, took par 72 on his last trip.

The tournament wound up with two playoffs. There was a three-way tie for low Canadian—who takes the Rivermead Cup and collects extra prize money of \$300—and Gordie Brydson of Toronto, Mississauga was the winner after two playoff holes.

Ernie Boros of Montreal Kanawaki was second, winning \$200, and Johnny Henrick of the Gatineau Club at Hull, Que., was third, getting \$100.

Sanders went through the four rounds with medal scores of 69-67-69-68 and Finsterwald had 67-69-67-70. Sanders was never leader after any round but was always well up and threatening. Finsterwald led the field only after the third round.

Sanders played his final round like a veteran pro. He was never over par at any hole. He birdied the long sixth where he was on in two and down easily in two putts. He made the turn in 35, and on the back nine birdied three more holes to clip three strokes off par with his 33.

**NOT FLUSTERED**  
 He had an easy birdie four at the 12th and at the 15th pulled off a 50-foot clip shot that plopped into the cup. Before he played the shot he glanced up at a TV camera man, waited a moment and then calmly chipped. At the par

five 18th he put his third shot three feet from the pin and ran down the birdie putt.

He wasn't at all flustered while waiting coolly for the last three-putt, which included Finsterwald and Furgol, to finish. Sanders chatted amiably.

"I played real good for me, particularly on the back nine," he said. "But I could have had a better score if I had been able to get started on the front nine. I missed three short putts for birdies there."

**WONT TURN PRO**  
 He said he has "no thoughts of turning pro but I would appreciate it if you'd dig up a little insurance business for me."

Sanders took 31 putts on his last round, five under putting par.

Finsterwald birdied the third hole with a seven-foot putt on his first nine and birdied the long sixth where he put his third shot three feet from the pin. He went over par at the seventh where his approach shot caught a trap.

Coming home he ran down a seven-footer at the 10th for a birdie four and missed an eagle with his chip at the 12th, his ball stopping an inch from the cup. He hooked his tee shot at par three seventh and took a four and went par the rest of the way, missing his five-foot birdie putt at the 18th where his ball rolled past the cup.

The last round Sunday was played in showery weather, with only a brief appearance by the sun early. Conditions were much the same as Saturday's third round except for a torrential downpour Saturday that held up play for more than 10 minutes.

## Speedboat Races Will Mark 58th Anniversary

RENFORTH, N.B. (CP)—Speed boat races, sailing events and swimming competitions will be held here Saturday to mark the 58th anniversary of the tragic world championship sculling race between the Paris Crew of Saint John, N.B., and the Tyne Crew of England.

The regatta, which has been an

annual event since 1898, will be held on the same wide expanse of the Kennebecas River where 15,000 people watched the Paris Crew successfully defend their title in 1871.

The four-man tyne crew was forced to withdraw from the race before reaching the finish line because their stroke, James Renforth, suffered a heart attack. He died shortly after he was lifted unconscious from the boat.

This tiny community, about nine miles from Saint John, was named in his honor.

Since the Paris Crew was re-

cently named to Canada's sports Hall of Fame, officials say they are increasing their efforts to make this year's regatta a success and stimulate interest in water sports.

## Marathon Swimmers Make 1st Attempt A Lake Ontario

YOUNGSTOWN, N.Y. (CP)—A well greased 49-year-old marathon swimmer and a 21-year-old dived into the mouth of the Niagara River Friday to become the first of this year's wildcat swimmers attempting to cross Lake Ontario.

At 3:07 p.m. EDT Jim Woods, 40, of Asheville, N.C., plunged from a rowboat into the river dividing Canada and the United States. At 5:30 p.m. he was reported to have gone six miles on his 32-mile course to Toronto.

Immediately after diving in off the boat alongside the coastguard wharf here, he struck out at 58 strokes to the minute. Onlookers said a 6 m.p.h. river current probably aided his speed. He started off from a rowboat because he was not allowed to touch the U.S. shore. He had not received swimming clearance from the U.S. authorities.

NEW YORK (AP)—Nashua, who cost the Leslie B. Combs II syndicate a world record price of \$1,251,200 last December, now has returned \$213,350 on the investment.
