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Hear Thrilling Canadian Choir In "Singing Champions"

Deep in the Acadian country of New Brunswick stands St. Joseph's University, a small classical college for boys. Founded almost a century ago, St. Joe's has never had quite enough money, yet never turned away a deserving scholar because he couldn't pay the fees.

Sons of fishermen, lawyers, farmers — of the sturdy folk of the Maritime Provinces — these are its students. And it was from these ordinary youngsters that a choir arose which carried the songs of its school and country far beyond Canada's own shores.

Father Leandre Brault and breath control are the big secrets of the choir's success. Founder and conductor, Father Brault works the boys hard, but his ready wit makes pleasure out of the effort. With his emphasis on breath control, developed through long hours of intoning Gregorian chants, he has given his singers amazing color and versatility. Not one boy is still there of the original group which first swept the Moncton Music Festival in 1947, yet the quality of the whole choir has never faltered.

It was radio official Hubert Burton who persuaded them to enter festival competition, to enrich folk singing with the grandeur of the Gregorian chant. Soon the boys had won Canada's top honors. Then people of the Maritimes sent them to Wales. There, and on the triumphant tour of Europe that followed, they were no longer St. Joseph's, but "That wonderful Canadian choir."

"Singing Champions" is the special Canada Carries On feature on the screen program at the Prince Edward starting Thursday.
