Very Latest Telegrams.

London, Feb. 24. In the Spanish Constitutional Cortes yesterday, Serrano, Prime Minister, officially announced the resignation of the Provisional Government. General Prim, Minister of War, in an address assured the House that the late dynasty would never ascend the Throne. Admiral Topeta, Minister of Marine Affairs, asked the House to pass an act of indemnity for the Navy for its acts during the recent Revolution. Subsequently the house passed a vote of thanks to the retiring Provisional Government, although the Republican members opposed it with unanimity. The House also by a large vote, intrusted Marshal Serrano with full Executive power for the time being, and granted him the authority necessary for the formation of a new Ministry. General Caballero Deroda is to succeed Gen. Dulce as Governor General of Cuba.

New York, Feb. 24. Despatches of yesterday from Cuba state that a decree is to be issued imposing an export duty from the 1st March next of 50c. per box and \$1.25 per hoghead on Sugar, \$1 per bale on Tobacco, and 50c. per thousand of Segars, and an addition of 6 per cent. on all internal taxes, the proceeds of which are to be paid weekly to the Spanish Bank to secure an advance of \$5,000,000 to the Government. The Female Labor question was discussed in Congress yesterday, and it was decided to increase salaries of the female clerks to \$1,200 per annum.

Montreal, Feb. 25. Brown's Bank and Exchange Office in Toronto has suspended, owing to heavy losses in New York.

Negotiations are in progress for getting the St. John crew and the Ward Brothers to compete at the Lachine Regatta next summer.

The authorities are actively preparing for the trial of Buckley and Doyle in March; in consequence of the late communication of Whelan, information of a new and important nature has been obtained against them; they are likely to swing.

Stone Cutters are on the strike in Montreal. Ten feet six inches of snow has fallen thus far.

Flour market almost at a stand still in consequence of snow storms. Sales of ordinary Supers at \$4.50, and Choice at \$4.52 to 4.60.

New York, Feb. 25. The Bill legalizing gold contracts, and declaring National Bonds payable in gold, passed the lower branch of Congress yesterday, by a vote of 119 to 61.

D. E. Reynolds, Supt. of the Buffalo (N.Y.) police, Capt. Henry Dickson, and two Detectives of the Niagara Frontier Police, are on trial before the Police Commissioners of Buffalo, charged with criminality and unlawfully kidnapping two men on the night of January 1st, and carrying them to Canada for a reward.

Gold 132 1/2. Montreal, Feb. 26. The dinner to Hon. Mr. Wood at Brantford last night was a complete success. Over 300 influential reformers and conservatives sat down in reply to the Mayor's address.

Bishop Lynch has issued a pastoral warning to his people against any attempt to establish Divorce Courts and make marriage a Civil Contract.

Windsor, Feb. 26. The meetings at Walton and Noel Road, were most successful. There were large majorities for Mr. Howe at both meetings. Goudge has not the most remote chance. Three hundred Antis in three Districts remain true to Howe.

The heavy snow of last night has taken a great deal of the snow away.

A terrible disaster occurred on Feb. 20th on board the frigate Radecky, while cruising on the Adriatic. An explosion took place in the powder magazine, making a complete wreck of the ship and causing great loss of life. Most of the officers, and crew were instantly killed or blown into the water and drowned.

If the United States are troubling Great Britain with Alabama Claims, they are not free themselves from similar vexations. At this moment the Spanish Minister at Washington is, for the third or fourth time, demanding from the United States Government the payment of certain claims known as the "Florida Claims." The claims are for damages inflicted upon Spanish subjects before the cession of Florida to the United States; the justice of them has never been denied, their payment was authorized by act of Congress, the necessary money was appropriated and is still lying in the Treasury subject to the order of the President. But the payment has been staved off for upwards of forty years, on one pretext or another.

A negro danced a jig in a Memphis bar-room with such vigor, that a pistol fell from a shelf behind the bar and exploded it. Nobody appeared to be hurt, until it was found that a colored girl, sitting upright in a chair was st. dead, the bullet having gone through her brain, killing her instantly.

A new welding composition has been patented in Belgium. It consists of 1,000 parts of iron filings, 500 parts of borax, 500 parts of balsam of copaiba or other resinous oil, with 75 parts of sal ammoniac. These ingredients are well mixed together, heated and pulverized. The process of welding is much the same as usual.

A young man named Jacob Manger, in the employ of Moore & Cole, of Rochester, N. Y., who, on a small salary of \$600 a year, has been making large purchases of real estate, has just confessed that he has been in the habit, since 1862, of robbing his employers almost daily. He restored property valued at \$8,250 and escaped prosecution.

A Hamilton newsboy, while passing along King Street, on Tuesday evening, crying out "Here's yer Times" was suddenly buried about two feet under the surface of an awning of snow, weighing over a ton, from a roof. The spectators were anxious about the little fellow's safety, until they heard a piping voice continuing the refrain—"only a penny," and the irrepressible urchin trotted off again.

A most painful calamity happened in Goderich Township, on Tuesday evening late in the day, Mrs. Emerson, in the absence of her husband, went to attend to the cattle in the barn. She left in the house two small children and an infant. Hearing their cries, the mother hurried to the house, to find the interior in flames. The infant was burnt to death, but the two oldest escaped. The house and contents were entirely consumed.—H. Reporter.
