Juvenile Delinquency Shows Drop Of 22 Cases In 1958

A decrease of 22 in the number of juvenile delinquents appearing in court during the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1958, was shown in the report of the director of child welfare contained in the report of the department of welfare and labor, tabled in the Legislature Thursday.

The decrease and the general low incidence of juvenile delinquency in P.E.I. was attributed by the child welfare director, to a great extent to the efforts of our judges who are much concerned with helping young offenders.

He also pointed out that the police had been most helpful and had approached the problem with the attitude that youthful offenders needed help and guidance not punishment.

TOTAL EXPENDITURES

The total expenditures for the department of welfare and labor last year amounted to \$1,028,947.72 and the total revenue was \$447,910.50.

During the year \$64,975, was actually expended for social assistance to some 300 families. Extra-mural tuberculosis assistance was paid out by the department to some 90 families in the amount of \$30,622.37.

The report of the director of child welfare showed that there still remained a need for parents who could give foster care, especially homes for handicap-

ped children and teen-aged boys and girls. At the end of March 31st, 183 children still remained in care of the department.

286 FAMILIES

The report of the director of mothers' allowances showed that a total of 286 families made up of 770 children had received assistance during the year, the benefits paid amounting to \$88,740.

Other expenditures included \$287,437.43 for 659 old age assistance pensioners, \$50,493.32 for blind-pensioners, and \$226,473.53 for disabled pensioners.

The report of the superintendent of Beach Grove showed that the institution continued to operate at a capacity 164 accommodation.

GOOD PROSPECTS

Hundreds of two-year-olds are being trained at Ben White Raceway, Orlando, Florida, and some good authorities claim that there are more good prospects among this year's group than any previous year.

Up to last week the standard for two-year-olds for this season was 2.30, but that was lowered to 2.28 4-5 by a pacing filly, Freightette, by Night Dream, dam Miss Reed, Earl Reaper, a pacing colt by Tar Heel, dam Early Dawn, paced in 2.29 2-5, and Freight Dean was timed in 2.28. Another from the same stable — A.B.C. Freight Forwarding Company — Legal Freight, paced in 2.31 2-5, and Freight Pride trotted in 2.33. From the above it will be seen that the A.B.C. Freight Forwarding Co., will have a lot of good ones out this year.

2-YEAR-OLDS
The Billy Haughton stable has not been asked to beat 2.30. The two-year-olds in the stable have worked as follows: J. T. Hennessy in 2.36, Meadow Dolly and Rapid Transit in 2.36, Beloved in 2.36 1-5, Mark Pick in 2.34, Meadow Rice in 2.38, Prince Dare in 2.35 3-5, Trader Beth in 2.37, with ten or twelve other all beating 2.40.

The Del Miller barn, also loca-

ted at Orlando, has a lot of good, young prospects. His two-year-olds have worked as follows: Countess Adios in 2.34, Adios Elite in 2.36, Meadow Emerald in 2.40, Judy's Dream, by Night Dream, in 2.38; his young trotters worked as follows: Duke of Decatur in 2.36, Demon Lynn in 2.37 and Worthy Sally and The Rooster also in 2.39.

John Simpson, whose stable cut such a big figure two years ago, has a lot of promising two-year-olds. They worked as follows: (pacers) — Lusty Freight in 2.31; Pitch Freight in 2.32; Bullet Hanover, Carlotta, Bomarc, and Greg Wolf, all in 2.30; Jamaica in 2.32. Simpson's best two-year-old trotter, Latona Hanover, worked in 2.32, Adolph Hanover in 2.39, Erna Hanover in 2.39. Yours Truly in 2.34.

What Simpson's considers to be the standout of his stable — Direct Justice — seems to have tremendous brush; another good prospect is Meadow Helene.

Not to be overlooked is Clint Hodgins — a Canadian trainer. Clint hasn't beaten 2.40 with any of his string, but he has a lot of good prospects. Other trainers that are quite enthusiastic about their charges are Fred Egan and his assistant trainer, "Flick" Nipe. They

have three two-year-old trotters that look very promising; it will be remembered it was Fred Egan and Flick Nipe that got the Hambletonian winner, Emily's Pride, ready and won the \$106,000 stake with her in 1958, with Little Rocky (J. O'Brien) winning the middle heat.

A WINNER
Islanders are always interested in the doings of Bay State Pat, the pacer that Andrew

Perry of Summerside bought for the proverbial "song" — a few hundred dollars — and, after winning in the Maritimes, his driver James (Roach) MacGregor took him to Quebec City where he was a standout pacer, and the next year he raced in Quebec, Richelieu track, Montreal, and in the Maritimes, beating many of the top pacers racing.

Beaudoin of Montreal, and we find on looking up in a recent issue of "The Harness Horse" the winnings of aged geldings in 1958, raced on U.S.T.A. tracks, that he is third from the top of the list with \$44,344.
