Roy Appleton Wins 6-Mile Road Race

Drenched with rain, but otherwise looking fit and completely untruffled, Roy Appleton of Glace Bay, N. S., broke the tape an easy winner in the annual Labor Day six-mile road race ahead of four other middle-distance runners here last evening.

Eating up the distance with an effortless but strong stride, Appleton covered the long grind from Winsloe in the excellent time of 34 minutes and 25 seconds despite a steady downpour of rain.

His time was two minutes and 24 seconds better than Charlottetown's Russell Doyle, who won the Festive Week six mile event here in July, and only placed fourth in last night's race in 36 minutes and 34 seconds.

Close behind Appleton was another Mainland distance runner Joe Richard of Saint John who finished one minute and 45 seconds later while veteran runner John Paul of Rocky Point, placed third in 37 minutes and 46 seconds. Paul is a former winner of the annual event.

A fifth entry in the event, Jack Hennessey of Charlottetown, didn't finish the course.

He particularly gave a full account of the results obtained so far in the experiments carried out in Ellerslie brook. He demonstrated full scale models and samples of the equipment used in this experiment and also displayed a fine specimen of sea trout obtained from the above mentioned stream. This trout weighed in the vicinity of two pounds.

He pointed out that the Island residents have the best trout streams in North America and it was his opinion that very few Islanders appreciate or are aware of this fact.

He also said that the Fisheries Research Council have a long term programme laid down on the trout and stream experimentation and was very pleased to see that the Fish and Game Association were being so successful in constructing dams and thereby increasing the angling areas on the Island.

He requested that should any anglers catch tagged trout to send the word to the Biological Station at Ellerslie brook. He would be very glad to know about it as this will aid them greatly in determining the movements of trout in and around Prince Edward Island streams.

A report was given by branch president Found and vice-president Bernard on the dams constructed this year in the County. It was gratifying to hear that a Beaton's dam at Colman has been repaired and is now in first class condition.

Mr. B. Graham Rogers of the Department of Industry and National Resources informed the meeting that work had commenced on August 30th on the building of the dam at Marchbanks in Wilnot Valley.

Dates for the annual field trials were announced and they are to be held in the Charlottetown area October 10th and 11th.

The 20-year-old Brooklyn welterweight died at 1:20 a.m. EDT of a brain injury. He had been in a coma since Wednesday night, when Roger Donoghue knocked him out in the eighth and final round of their bout in Madison Square Garden.
