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Co-Op Fund Raising Program In Difficulty

A fund-raising program for "Co-operatives Everywhere," which assists co-operatives in Canada North and West, was described as disappointing yesterday by the Co-op president, Ralph S. Staples of Ottawa, who said that such services were already being used, and suggested the only two ways of fund-raising are by two ways of individuals and by executive general public, cooperative Union of Canada directors' and officers report.

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SEE INDIVIDUALS "The best way to raise money is to go and see individuals," he concluded.

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An additional suggestion was that the CUC "build the image of co-operatives as the effective voice and instrument of the Canadian consumer."

James MacDonald, executive secretary of the national labor-co-operative committee, who introduced the resolution, said the co-op movement must speak out on consumer problems.
