LET'S TALK IT OVER Looking Back One May Well Miss The Pathway

Every now and again when the P.E.I. school system is criticized, some old timer comes forth and reminds everyone how very far we have come from the twilight days. Usually an old teacher, he reminds us that he taught in those days a labor of love on his part for the merest pittance, and contrast the comparative munificence of teachers' salaries on P.E.I. today with the meagre recompense received in those days. It must be admitted there is a pretty wide difference between the two salary scales. No one can successfully argue against that. Can you imagine a salesman today setting forth the advantages of one of the popular makes of cars by comparing it with the buggy of yesteryear? Such comparison would leave prospective buyers pretty cold, wouldn't it? No, he has to try to put over to his prospective customers the advantages of his particular make over other makes of cars today. Certainly we have come a long way from those early days in our modern school system. The fellow finishing last in a 25 mile road race has come a long way from the starting point too. Unfortunately he didn't come fast enough, however, and all the other fellows are away ahead of him. This is precisely the situation in P.E.I. Our system, in point of teachers' salaries and general education efficiency, comes very close to trailing the field. This cannot be charged entirely to our being a poor province because the relation which teachers' salaries bear to the salaries of other professions and business occupations on Prince Edward Island is lower than in the other provinces. Statistics that prove that are readily available. Granted that education is a poor relation in virtually all the provinces, a fact which does not speak well for the enlightenment of our modern civilization. On P.E.I. it is a knight of the open road asking for a hand-out and a chance to sleep in somebody's hayloft.

SUSPENSE DRAMA AT CAPITOL THEATRE SUMMERSIDE

The picture with the heavily advertised surprise ending, "Beyond A Reasonable Doubt," promised by RKO and Producer Bert Friedlob to be something new in suspense shockers, opened today at the Capitol Theatre, and comes up to expectations on each count. Shocks begin in the opening sequence, an eyewitness scene of an electric chair execution. It poses today's question of what to do about abolishing capital punishment and thereby avoid death sentence convictions based on circumstantial evidence. Dana Andrews, portraying a humanitarian-novelist, plans secretly to solve the problem in partnership with his future father-in-law, a newspaper publisher. Sidney Blackmer has the publisher role and lovely Joan Fontaine, Andrews' co-star in the film, enacts the fiancée, a girl too deep in love to realize that her husband-to-be is deliberately becoming enmeshed in the mystery murder of a strip-tease performer. Planting false but incriminating evidence is a part of the scheme to force an arrest and, after a strip-show nightclub adventure, the novelist is jailed. Trial and a death sentence conviction follow. At this point, the conspiracy goes wrong and the hero faces execution.
