Visit Fell On Birthday Of Hon. Dr. J. J. Bowlen

The visit of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip Tuesday was a memorable occasion for Hon. Dr. J. J. Bowlen, lieutenant-governor, who Tuesday, July 21st, marked his 83rd birthday.

The governor was on hand to greet the royal couple at Namao airport Monday night when they arrived from the north. The welcoming group included Premier Manning and Mayor Hawrelak. Appointed to his present post in 1950, His Honor welcomed the Queen when, as Princess Elizabeth, she came here in 1951 accompanied by Prince Philip. Last October, during a visit to London the governor had an audience with the Queen.

The governor was born July 21, 1876, in Cardigan, Prince Edward Island. He was a prominent rancher in southern Alberta for many years and served as a member of the Alberta Legislature for 14 years.

Dr. Harison Villett Is Chairman Of Billeting

The 19th General Council of The United Church of Canada will be held in Edmonton in September, 1960, at McDougall United Church.

Four hundred ministers and lay men and women will attend from across Canada as well as from the overseas missions fields of the Church.

An arrangement committee has been established with Rev. Arthur Cragg of Knox United Church, Chairman; Professor John Toogood, Vice-Chairman; Rev. Donald B. Macdonald, minister of McDougall Church, Secretary; and E. J. Buchanan, Treasurer.

Dr. Harison Villett as Chairman of the billeting committee and Mrs. D. K. McElroy, President of the Presbytery WA, will arrange accommodation in Alberta College, St. Stephen's College and the University residences.

An historical pageant, commemorating the centennial year of Rev. George McDougall's posting as a missionary to the west in 1860, is planned for presentation during General Council, in the Jubilee Auditorium. Rev. Gerald Hutchinson of Telfordville and Chairman of the Archives Committee was chosen to select appropriate materials and secure a skilled producer.

The press, radio and TV committee to work with the Board of Information and Stewardship of the United Church, selected Rev. A. E. King, minister of Highlands United Church, as chairman with George B. Cooper, press liaison officer, and Fred Miller for local radio and TV coverage.

Rev. Dr. Ernest E. Long, General Secretary, The United Church of Canada, will visit Edmonton in September to coordinate the work of all committees.

Two important features of the

General Council in 1960 will be the celebration nationally, of the 90 anniversary of Church Union in Canada and the reception of the "one millionth" member into The United Church of Canada. The objective for the Missionary and Maintenance Fund for 1960 has been set at \$10,000,000.
