U.S. Rejects Underground Testing Ban

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—The United States has rejected a bid by 34 non-nuclear countries to stop underground tests of nuclear weapons. It said it wants "safeguards against abuses" before it would agree to such tests.

The U.S. disarmament negotiator, William C. Foster, told the UN General Assembly's main political committee: "A

moratorium on underground testing is unacceptable to the United States."

Swedish Ambassador Sverker Astrom, acting for the 34 countries, had just introduced a resolution urging "that all nuclear weapon tests be suspended."

He called on the nuclear powers for "real sacrifices" to end all tests.

Underground tests are the only kind allowed by the 1963 Moscow test-ban treaty, which forbids testing in the air, in space and under water.

The draft resolution calls on all countries to respect that treaty. China and France are the only nuclear powers that have not signed the treaty.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

North dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:
North East South West

Opening lead—ace of spades. Here is an extraordinary hand played in a pair championship. The results were many and varied at the different tables, but the best result for a North-South pair occurred at the table where the bidding went as shown.

West chose what was probably the best action to take with his hand when he cuebid three diamonds, but North brought considerable pressure to bear against both opponents by leaping to six diamonds.

East should not have doubted—he could easily have stood a six spade bid if West's hand called for it. A forcing pass by East would have been more normal, but, in the actual

case, it would probably have been effective. Six spades could not be made by West—against the lead of the ace and another heart—though it could not have been defeated if played by East.

West, on lead against six diamonds, made the unfortunate choice of the ace of spades, and South thereupon provided to make the contract.

He ruffed the spade, trumped a heart, played a diamond to the ace, learning that it had to lose a trump trick, and then cashed the ace of hearts. On the two rounds of hearts West had followed with the 10-Q while East played the 2-6.

Declarer now led the jack of hearts, East playing the seven, and South then found himself in a quandary.

After great thought he decided to discard a club. There were two excellent reasons for this. First, there was the much greater chance that West had been dealt two heart honors rather than three.

Second, and far more important, was the certainty that the contract could not be made if the hearts were divided 3-3, but could be made if they were divided 4-2. Accordingly, South discarded a club, ruffed a heart ruffed a spade, and then discarded his last club on the nine of hearts, thus making six diamonds doubled with only 11 high-card points!

Pearson Announced Trip Plans

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson has announced details of an official and holiday trip to the Caribbean which he begins Sunday.

Mr. and Mrs. Pearson fly to Kingston, Jamaica, Sunday after attending the Grey Cup game Saturday in Toronto.

His official visits to Jamaica and Trinidad and Tobago will be the first official visits by a Canadian prime minister to these islands since they became independent.

Mr. Pearson will be in Jamaica from Sunday to Tuesday and in Trinidad and Tobago Dec. 14-16. In between the two official visits, Mr. and Mrs. Pearson will vacation on a small island near St. Martin in the Leeward Islands.

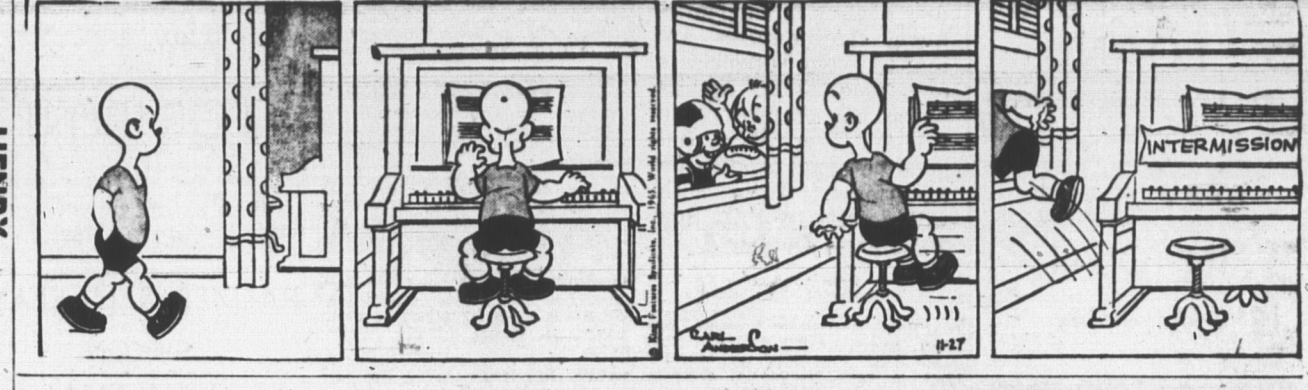
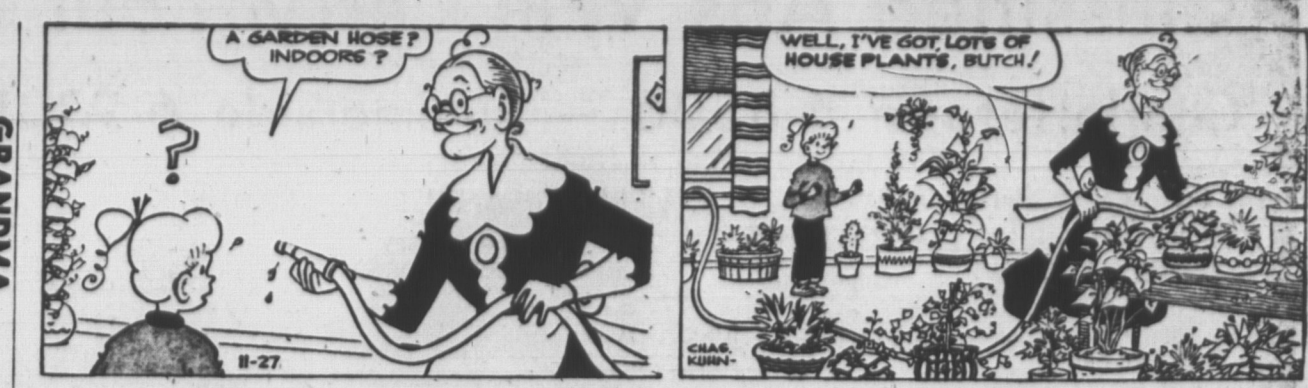
They will return to Ottawa Dec. 16.

The prime minister will be met in Kingston Sunday by Acting Prime Minister Donald Sangster of Jamaica, who will give a dinner for Mr. Pearson that evening.

After his two-week private holiday, the prime minister will go to Port of Spain Dec. 14 where he will be met by Prime Minister Eric Williams of Trinidad and Tobago.

The following day he will hold talks with Mr. Williams and government officials, visit the legislature and attend a reception given by Dr. Williams.
