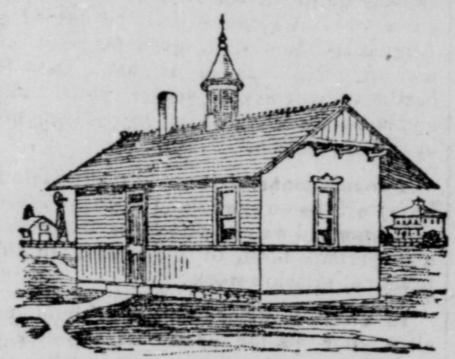

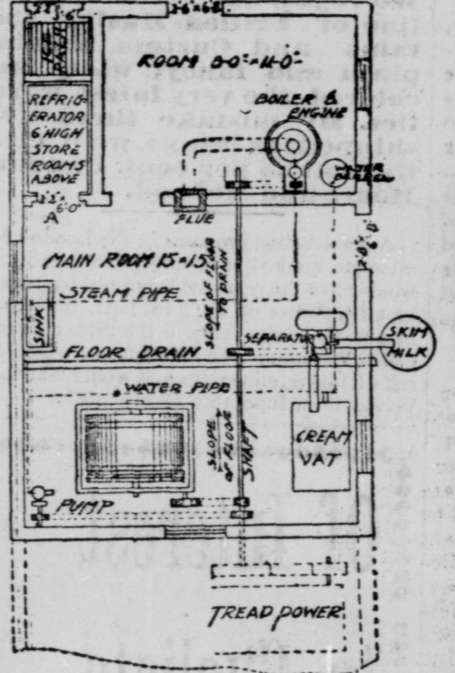

### FARM CREAMERY.

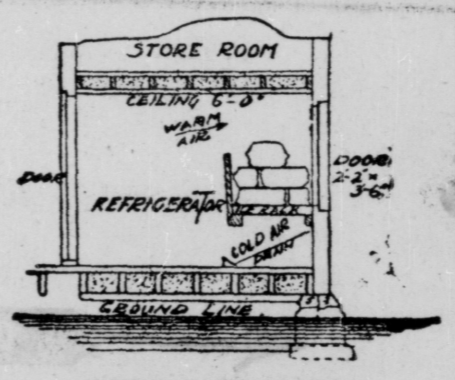
suited to the Dairyman Who Makes Butter at Home.  
 A farmer with a large number of cows and not very near a creamery can often build a creamery and make butter advantageously at home. In many cases, too, his neighbors similarly situated will

 haul milk to his creamery, and with this addition the beginning of a large and flourishing business can be made.  
 The editor of Hoard's Dairyman publishes the following plans for such a creamery. He says of them:  
 We have received several requests for a plan for a farm creamery. At least one of these stipulated that provision should be made for using steam power and stated that convenience and utility should not be sacrificed to cost. Another wanted a detailed design for the refrigerator, and still another thought he would prefer to run his separator and churn with a tread power.  
 The main building is 16 by 24 feet, outside dimensions, and the cut shows wide, projecting eaves in order to protect the sides from the excessive heat of the sun in summer. We think this feature

 of the plan worthy of attentive consideration. The extra cost will be inconsiderable and the resulting benefit quite perceptible.  
 The ground plan is fully self explanatory, the broken lines at the bottom indicating the place where a tread power may be located in case steam is not used. The draftsman has specified one of the combined churns and butter workers, as this is the latest demand of our progressive butter makers. It is by no means indispensable, and separate machines for these purposes may be substituted.  
 In the matter of construction, regard should be had to keeping out the cold in winter and the heat in summer. To this end it is well to provide at least two dead air spaces, and every mechanic worthy of the name knows how to do this by using building paper. This may be done without increasing the thickness of the walls, but we should prefer to

 curtail the inside dimensions somewhat and make the outside walls ten inches instead of six.  
 We believe it better to have a separate building for an icehouse. These structures go to decay very rapidly and are never quite free from filth.  
 Build a fireplace at the bottom of the flue opening into the main room and also leave an opening near the ceiling, to which fit a register that may be opened or closed at pleasure. This will in a measure obviate the necessity for building the cupola. The latter, however, adds to the symmetry of the building, and, if connected with the room below by a flue leading to it, will not be wholly unserviceable.
