**Big Question For Quebec, How SC Party Will Fare**

MONTREAL (CP)—For Quebecers, the big question in the federal election campaign at the moment is how Real Caouette and the Social Credit party will fare.

Will Social Credit lose some of the 26 seats won last June? Or will it win as many as 40?

Eric Kierans, president of the Montreal Stock Exchange, recently ventured into the territory in a service club speech, attacking the party's monetary policies.

Replying to the Social Credit spokesman of the last election—"You have nothing to lose"—Mr. Kierans said, "You have everything to lose."

The financier immediately became a favorite whipping boy for Mr. Caouette, especially in front of audiences in marginal farm areas and in economically weak districts where the Social Credit party has a strong following.

Mr. Caouette's support, a Jesuit economist who gives courses on TV, said in a television lecture on economics that Social Credit policies would lead to inflation. Father Bouvier spoke in St-Barthelemy, centre of another Caouette stronghold.

Mr. Caouette replied on the hustings: "I respect the religious character of Father Bouvier, but as an economist he is out of the pot on potatoes."

**Stolen Bonds Bring Sentence**

CLEVELAND (AP)— Marvin L. Gold, 32, convicted of using \$50,000 worth of stolen Canadian bonds as collateral for loans from two Cleveland banks, has been sentenced to eight years in federal prison and fined \$30,000 by U.S. District Judge Frank J. Battisti.

There was no evidence presented at the five-day trial to show how the bonds, which were stolen from Quebec banks in 1959 and 1960, came into Gold's possession.

Asked if he had anything to say before sentence was passed, Gold told the court: "I pleaded not guilty before the trial and I know I'm still not guilty of anything."

Judge Battisti replied: "I heard the trial and I have considered the evidence carefully. I found you guilty."

Justice Battisti, who heard the other part of the case involving Gold, 25, but deferred sentence pending a report from the court's probation department.

PARIS (AP)—The current issue of the widely circulated French women's magazine, raises its editorial eyebrows at the dress of Queen Elizabeth and the masterpieces of Prince Philip on their current Australian tour.

This hand was played many years ago, which may perhaps account for some of the bids that led to the final contract of six clubs doubled, played by South.

Declarer was Waldemar von Zettwitz, who has been closely associated with contract bridge from the time the game was first introduced in 1936 clear on today.

Knut, one of the keenest analysts in the history of the game as well as one of its most able players, Waldy took advantage of a slight defensive slip to bring home the slam.

Waldy led a spade, taken with the king, and East returned the jack of hearts. Waldy flashed the queen and returned the three of clubs. When West followed with the two, Waldy played the king. The finesse succeeded all right, as seemed quite likely from the bidding, and from then the sailing was smooth. Declarer cashed the ace of hearts, led a diamond, ruffed it at heart with the queen, led the seven of clubs and a finessed the nine, ruffed another heart with the ace, and next entered dummy by ruffing a spade.

The K of clubs then drew West's trump, and the A K of diamonds won on the last two tricks. The only trick the defender took was the ten of spades.

The newly club finesse at trick three was a fancy play, but absolutely essential to making the contract. It would not have been possible to bring home the slam without the deep finesse. The d u m m y reversal could not have succeeded without it.

It is true that West could have jammed the trick by playing the six of clubs instead of the deuce at trick three, but this does not diminish the master of von Zettwitz's play once he was given a chance to finesse the king. Waldy's advantage of defensive lapses is certainly an important tool in declarer's arsenal of weapons.
