Since 1952, a United Nations emergency force contingent has prevented Egypt from using its gun emplacements on the Gulf of Aqaba to bar Israeli shipping from Eilat.

Nasser's threat is an indication of the strong feeling the Rhodesian situation has caused in the Middle East. Even as his remarks were being broadcast, United Arab Republic representatives met with other Africans in Tanzania to consider action by the Organization of African Unity.

Highlights in the past year have, of course, been the third largest wheat crop on record, wheat exports second only to 1963-64 clearances, and the negotiations of further large wheat sales to the Soviet Union and China.

Complete data on the pack of vegetable crops are not yet available. The outlook is good for the packs of tomatoes, peas, green beans and potatoes, but early frost caused a reduction of sweet corn and wax beans.

The report notes that in Saskatchewan, about four-fifths of farm cash income is from products marketed through agricultural marketing boards. In Alberta, Manitoba and Ontario the proportion is about one-half; in British Columbia and Prince Edward Island, two-fifths; in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, close to one-third; and in Quebec about one-fifth.

Clots In Lung Arteries

By Dr. Theodore R. Van Dellen The seven-hour operation on Miss Dorothy Malone focused our attention on pulmonary embolism. Clots were removed from the lung arteries to restore the circulation to part of the respiratory tract.

Drugs are given to relieve the pain and dilate the pulmonary arteries. Oxygen and transfusions are needed to combat shock. It is possible now to remove the clots by surgery. This is a tedious process because an artificial respiratory device must be installed to take over while the chest is open and the clots are removed or flushed out.

Well Done, Mr. Premier!

It was perhaps a tribute to the forcefulness with which Premier Shaw scored our Island disadvantages in his address in Montreal on Wednesday that this part of his remarks received almost exclusive attention in the Canadian Press report which went across Canada. Indeed, it was over-played in the opening paragraph of the report, which credited the Premier with describing us as a province "not as prosperous in the 20th century as when it joined Confederation in 1873," and going on from there with a truly lamentable tale of woes.

Moreover, he said, "the influence and the power of individual and group initiative have been developed. Greater production as a result of organized effort has resulted. Our people are today working closely with our government in a common program of expansion. Many small industries and a number of large processing plants have been established dealing chiefly in the natural products of the province. For the first time in years our products are going to European markets. There is a new feeling of optimism abroad among our people. We expect further developments and we are looking forward with faith to the future."

We trust that the full text of his speech will be published and that means will be found of distributing it across Canada—particularly of placing it in the hands of all our parliamentarians. It requires, as we suggested above, to be studied in its entirety. If the opportunity for doing so is provided before the new Parliament meets in Ottawa, it could be of great assistance to our Island representatives in furthering our interests federally.

Anti-Rhodesian Action

To United Arab Republic President Nasser, the white-minority government of Rhodesia now is on the same footing as the state of Israel. He has declared that a "state of war" exists between the UAR and Rhodesia, and has forbidden Rhodesia-bound merchandise to use the Suez Canal. This interdiction puts the oil embargo which African and Communist states are demanding against the Ian Smith regime in a new light.
