A DIFFERENT VIEW.

At New Haven, last evening, Sir Louis Davies denounced Mr. H. H. Cook as a man who wanted a senatorship and didn't get it. But he commended Mr. Charlton and said that while Mr. Charlton talked as he did he would continue to be a supporter of the Government.

It is unfortunate for Sir Louis Davies that the chief organ of the Liberal party in Montreal—issued under the eyes of Sir Wilfrid Laurier—takes a different view. It reviews Mr. Charlton's position in unfriendly terms, and says:

"In concluding his address, Mr. Charlton proclaimed himself an independent candidate, which position he somewhat qualified in his speech at Delhi by the declaration that he would, if elected, endeavor to uphold Liberal principles in the future as in the past. It is clear, however, that he considers himself without allegiance to the recognized leaders of the Liberal party and as he carefully refrains from saying a good word for the Liberal leaders; and especially for Sir Wilfrid Laurier, there seems to be little for it but to conclude that if elected he will hold himself open to make whatever arrangements he pleases with either party."

And again, "It may be doubted if his best friends will see in Mr. Charlton's recent behaviour anything which improves his status of a public man. While he has really done little to comfort the Opposition, he has shown himself indisposed to render to his leaders that loyalty which, as Sir Richard Cartwright has said, party leaders may fairly expect from members of the party without any sacrifice of their self-respect."

Those who heard Sir Louis last evening will draw their own conclusions.

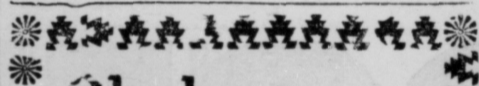
Miss Edith Longworth left this morning for Sydney.

They are loading the bright New Dominion with oats for Dalhousie at Redway wharf, the Sadie is loading hay and oats for Gaspe at West Point, and the Harvest Home is taking in oats at Crispand.

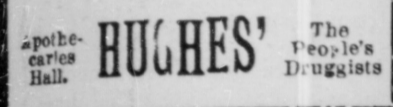
