

New Ferry Seen Needed To Cut Delay

"Long delays on the Wood Islands - Caribou run will not be eased until the completion of the new ferry, a sister ship to the 'Lord Selkirk,'" Capt. Claude Hunter, president of Northumberland Ferries, Ltd. said yesterday in commenting on the heavy traffic experienced at the terminal over the weekend.

He said long delays were evident at the terminal and some vehicles undoubtedly left the pier.

"But," Mr. Hunter said, "that's nothing new as we've been facing the same thing for the last seven weeks, when we've broken all previous records."

Traffic was also heavy at the Borden Terminal but no undue delays were experienced.

The ferries on the Borden-Tormentine run carried 1,022 cars to Tormentine on Sunday, and 828 to Borden. On Saturday, they ferried 884 to Tormentine and 714 to Borden. That's very heavy traffic, said CNR Superintendent E. C. Taylor.

1.5 inch Rainfall Causes Flooding in City Streets

Many streets in Charlottetown turned to rivers with the tremendous rainfall yesterday. A total of 1.5 inches fell on this city it was reported by the radio range, following their measurement last night.

Low areas in the city turned into lakes as the downpour lasted the afternoon and part of the evening. Lower Grafton Street, by the railway tracks had an estimated 18 inches of water as the storm sewers were not able to handle the sudden overflow.

Churchill Avenue was a mass of water, with lawns and backyards covered with it. The water flowed into homes in this area before it began to recede about 7:30.

Norman Stewart, city engineer, stated that no serious physical damage resulted from the storm, but a great deal of inconvenience was caused by the water level in the basements.

The city pumps were at work as soon as the rain let up, Mr. Stewart said. Some storm sewers cleared streets of water but the flooding was caused by other storm sewers not being large enough to cope with the situation, he stated.

Water on Spring Park Road receded, the one foot level and a massive pond was created near the railway station on Water Street.

The rain began early yesterday afternoon and hit full force around 4 p.m., continuing until just before 7:00 o'clock. Traffic was slowed down considerably by the collection of water on corners and even in the upturn area it reached to the wheel bases of most cars on some corners.
