A CANADIAN NAVAL RESERVE

The Question Discussed in the Commons

OUR NEW STEAMER TO BE NAMED "THE MINTO"

Will be Launched in August—Sir Louis Criticized.

OTTAWA, May 13.—In the discussion of the Marine and Fisheries matters yesterday, Sir Louis Davies explained that the new steamship to take the place of the Stanley would be launched in August.

She is to be brought over from Scotland by Captain Finlayson and will be named the Minto.

Sir Louis' department came in for sharp criticism at the hands of Mr. McDougall, of C. B., and other members for the high prices paid for supplies to the Government cruiser.

The question of the establishment of a permanent force of drilled and trained men in connection with the fishery protection cruisers was discussed at some length.

Sir Louis Davies was endeavoring to develop the scheme by which the men on the Government cruisers might be offered for service in the Imperial navy during the four winter months of each year, looking towards their enrollment in the royal navy reserve.

A. C. McDonald, P. E. Island, strongly advocated the establishment of a naval reserve. He regretted that Provincialists were enlisting in the United States navy.

Mr. McDonald reminded Sir Louis that some good men and officers engaged on the steamer Stanley were dismissed, he feared for political reasons.

This was not the way to provide a strong permanent force.

Sir Louis Davies said that such dismissals may have been made on the Stanley, but denied that political dismissals took place in the fishery protection service.

The motion to reduce the vote of supplies to the Government steamers by \$33,000 was lost on division.

Sir Charles Hubert Tupper pointed out the need of a survey for coast waters.

Sir Louis Davies said that no practical navigators had urged this survey on the Government. Scientists were in favor of it, but practical men took other views.

BANK OF MONTREAL

Big Profits of Our Premier Monetary Institution.

MONTREAL, May 13.—The annual statement of the Bank of Montreal shows, after debiting charges of management and making full provision for all bad and doubtful debts of \$1,350,582,—which a balance of profit and loss from last year increases to \$2,302,792.

Two dividends of five per cent, amounting to \$1,200,000, were paid, leaving a balance of over \$1,100,000 to be carried over.

The profits for previous year amounted to \$1,265,300 an increase this year of \$85,252.

Railway Collision at Reading, Pa.

READING, Pa., May 13.—Last night a collision of passenger trains occurred on the Philadelphia and Reading at Exeter Station, six miles below Reading. The express train from Philadelphia which was behind schedule time in leaving and stopped at Exeter for orders and the special train from Harrisburg bearing excursionists left here twenty minutes later than the express train, and at Exeter while proceeding at a rapid speed coasted into the express.

Several cars of the express train were wrecked. The number of dead is fully 25, injured 50.

Torpedo Nets Given up.

LONDON, May 12.—The admiralty has decided to abolish the torpedo nets with which the cruiser Crescent, which is to be the flagship of the North American and West Indian squadron, is equipped.

NEWS NOTES.

Three mass meetings were held in Chicago last Sunday to endorse the U. S. government policy in regard to the Philippines. The demonstration was called forth by an anti-expansion meeting on the preceding Sunday. The speakers last Sunday included a bishop, a clergyman, a judge, two congressmen and other prominent men. A despatch says the aggregate attendance was ten thousand persons, and every mention of McKinley and Dewey was loudly cheered.

More than 700 Cuban stevedores are now on strike, and the work on ships in the harbor is being done by Chinese, under police guard. The stevedores had been receiving 25 cents an hour and are striking for an increase of ten cents. Many vessels are delayed by the strike, and the boats that are due to leave tomorrow will not be able to sail before next week.
