

## Union Head Critical Of Newsprint Price Boost

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—The president of the International Brotherhood of Paper Makers (AFL) said Tuesday that the only reason for the increases in the price of newsprint is that newsprint manufacturers "know they can get more money for it."

"This, after all the nonsense about costs, is the only reason why any price is raised," Paul L. Phillips said in a statement.

The paper makers union claims to represent 75,000 workers in 33 states and six Canadian provinces.

Phillips said "it has become a popular notion that, when workers in any industry secure improvements in their wages, there must be a corresponding increase in the price of the goods they make."

He said that Sir Eric Bowater, head of the Bowater Paper Corp., had expressed this sentiment in a recent press conference at which Bowater predicted a general rise in the price of newsprint.

### UTTER NONSENSE

"This is utter nonsense, particularly in the newsprint industry, and the manufacturers and publishers know it," Phillips declared. Since Bowater's prediction, two Canadian manufacturers, St. Lawrence Corp. and Abitibi Power and Paper Corp. have announced \$5 price increases—from \$126 to \$131 a ton (U. S. funds) delivered in New York. Both companies attributed the move to rising costs of operation.

Phillips said Bowater's recent remarks "contributed, perhaps inadvertently, to the fashion among industrialists to pin the blame for price increases on wage increases

secured by unions." He continued: "What he (Bowater) should have said, and what he undoubtedly was thinking, is that the companies are going to charge more for newsprint because they know they can get more."

### UNION CONCERNED

Phillips said his union was concerned about newsprint prices because a general price increase would deal "a crippling blow" to small newspapers and non-commercial publications.

"Too many publications have gone out of existence in recent years," he said. "This poses a threat to the free expression of ideas. We need more papers, not fewer, if our democracy is to flourish."

## 20 Years In Fur Business

etc. Janet's personality needs the support of understanding, appreciative endorsement — forthcoming from certain key persons whose judgment she trusts, and who are generally admired and socially able. She needs to feel fondly okayed, "as is," by some few whose preference carries weight.

ISN'T A HELP

It is sadly obvious that you are

not psychologically geared to breathe relaxed self-esteem into Janet, or to give her a lift when she feels inadequate. Rather, she sees her worst fears magnified in your stricken eyes, as you agonize inwardly over her "failures" (as they seem to you)—and see in her a repeat, as it were, of your hidden griefs.

There is help for Janet, of course. A good psychologist in family relations, working with and through you—after studying the situation firsthand—ought to make a big difference for the better. The specialist should give you corrective insight into your own anxiety neurosis, which fosters Janet's difficulty. And it may prove advisable to take Janet out of school for a term and provide private tutoring to keep her abreast of her classes, while she gathers confidence in herself and learns to think and speak on her feet.

In the town through which you write, there are several community agencies offering specialist know-how. Among them are the Family and Children's Service, the Child
