### CONTRACT BRIDGE

Mike took the queen with the ace and returned the three. West ruffed the king with the six of spades.

Without the benefit of the suit-direction convention, West would have found it somewhat difficult to choose between a diamond or club return, since either return could be correct—depending upon the makeup of the East hand.

But Mike had led back his lowest heart and this commanded Steve to lead a club which he did. (If East had been void of diamonds, he would have returned a high heart to direct the high suit, diamonds to be played.)

Mike took the club with the ace and returned a low heart to declarer's ten in order to force Steve to ruff and possibly promote a trump trick for himself. This was not bad thinking for a teen-ager, and Mike was well rewarded when Steve ruffed with the nine and forced dummy to overruff with the jack.

Declarer now had to go down as a result of the excellent defense. He played the queen of spades from dummy, covered by the king and ace, and returned to dummy to lead the seven of spades, covered by the eight and ten.

Mike was then able to take the setting trick with the five of spades, which, somehow or other, had become the highest trump!

Opening lead—two of hearts. There would be a lot of guesswork in defensive play were it not for the use of certain conventions developed over the years. Effective defense rests largely on partnership cooperation and a pair who work in unison on defense can generally exact every last ounce of value from their cards.

I am reminded of this by today's hand, played in the Reisinger team of four championship by my sons Mike and Steve, both life masters and apparently chips off the old block. They were defending against four spades, reached in the manner shown.

Steve led his singleton heart.

## Soviet Union Fishing Boats May Go After Pacific Hake

SEATTLE (AP) — Russian fishing boats may seek a new food fish, hake, in the Pacific coastal waters of America this year, Senator Warren G. Magnuson said here.

"Word has reached me through classified sources that the Soviet far eastern fish administration expeditionary flotillas have found concentrations of Pacific hake during recent cruises and are planning to enter the fishery this year," Magnuson said in a telegram from Washington.

He said the Soviet findings confirm the magnitude of the Pacific hake resource as indicated by bureau of commercial fisheries exploratory work.

Hake, a cod-like fish long considered scrap and a nuisance to commercial fishermen, has been found recently to be useful if ground into a protein concentrate. Such fish flour now may be used as food only for an-
