

Brooklyn Dodgers In 14-8 Win Over Cardinals

(By The Associated Press) Brooklyn bats roughed up six St. Louis pitchers for 14 hits in a 14-8 National League victory Tuesday that spoiled Eddie Stanky's Ebbets field "homecoming" as Cardinal manager despite a pair of two-run homers by Stan Musial.

Preacher Roe, the Dodgers' "Tuesday pitcher," pitched like it was Wednesday or Thursday as he let most of an early 6-0 lead slip through his fingers in his fifth straight Tuesday start.

Ben Wade rescued the Preacher in the fourth and won his first major league game. Wade also hit his first major league homer in the sixth and a double in the eighth.

Outfielder Larry Miggins of the Cards hit his first big league homer with Willy Westlake on base in the fourth.

From the moment Gil Hodges drove his third home run into the Duke left field seats, following Duke Snider's double in the second, the Brooks never were headed.

A four-run outburst that chased loser Joe Presko and Willard Schmidt in the third gave Roe a big cushion. But five straight hits, including Miggins' homer and doubles by Red Schoendienst and Westlake, brought Wade from the bullpen.

The Brooks kept piling it on while Stanky switched pitchers, scoring four more in the fifth when both Andy Pafko and Snider delivered two-run singles.

Stan Musial drove a tremendous two-run homer over the right field screen into a parking lot across the street in the seventh. In the ninth he repeated the trick, following a walk to peanuts Lowrey.

A full schedule of four night games was scheduled in the American League with three night games in the National.

British Soccer Team Sails For Tour of Canada

LONDON, May 13 (CP) — A fastidious, disciplined band of soccer will be dished up by Tottenham Hotspur, London's famed aggregation of professionals, on their four-weeks' exhibition tour of Canada, beginning May 22 in Toronto.

Before the team of 15 players and four officials sailed tonight from Liverpool aboard the Empress of Scotland, manager Arthur Rowe said his boys will give the Canadian fans a display of real cup-tie football they will remember for a long time.

"We've heard a great deal from previous touring teams about the grand Canadian crowds and I think they are going to like our disciplined type of play," Rowe said. "We are very much looking forward to the trip."

The Spurs were nominated by the experts early in the season but ended, as the team most likely to wind up as Wembley Cup finalists. But in the fourth round they bowed out to Newcastle United, which won the cup for the second year running by defeating Arsenal 1-0.

The Football Association, however, selected Tottenham's full-back Alf Ramsey, half-back Bill Nicholson and the brilliant forward ace, Eddie Baily, to play for the English international side on the continent this month.

So those three reluctantly remained behind when their colleagues took off for Canada. They will join the team after three games on the continent.

Senators' Owner Sells Nephew To Philadelphia

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP) — Clark Griffith, owner of Washington Senators, today sold his nephew, Sherry Robertson, to Philadelphia Athletics for an undisclosed sum.

Robertson, an outfielder, has been in the majors for nine years. Used chiefly as a utility man and as a pinch-hitter, Robertson hit only .189 last year. His five-year batting average is .240.

Robertson's ties with the management were far closer than most players. In addition to being Griffith's nephew, he was a brother of Calvin Griffith, vice-president of the Senators. Calvin is an adopted son of Clark Griffith.

The departure of Robertson brings the club down to the player limit of 25.

Cincinnati Reds St. Louis Cardinals In Player Trade

CINCINNATI, O., May 13 (AP) — Gabe Paul, general manager of Cincinnati Reds, tonight announced a two-for-two trade with St. Louis Cardinals which will send outfielder Dick Sisler and shortstop Virgil Stallcup to the Cards in exchange for outfielder Wally Westlake and infielder Eddie Kazak.

Paul said no cash was involved. Sisler was obtained by the Reds during the winter from Philadelphia Phils, while Stallcup has been on the Reds roster for several years.

The Cardinals obtained Westlake from Pittsburgh last year. Kazak has been Cardinal property for some time.

Consolation Daily Double

YONKERS, N. Y., May 13 (AP) — Starting Thursday night, Yonkers Raceway will have a special consolation daily double to protect bettors who have a winning horse in the first race and a scratched horse in the second race. To win in the regular daily double, you must pick the winners of the first two races.

William H. Cane, president of the harness track, said today Yonkers had been granted permission by the State Harness Racing Commission to provide the consolation daily double.

If the steward, judges or starter scratch or excuse a horse before the start of the second race, those who have coupled the non-starting horse with the winner of the first race will share in a special pool.

The track also will refund money wagers in the double if a horse in the first or second half of the double is excused or scratched before the start of the first race.

Pacific Coast Hockey League Changes Name

SEATTLE, May 13 (CP) — The Pacific Coast Hockey League, which stretches to Saskatoon, officially changed its name today to the Western Hockey League.

Last year the professional league added three Canadian Prairie cities on a tryout basis. Today the three reported they were happy with the arrangement and the league voted to make it permanent.

It is an eight-team circuit, with Vancouver, Victoria and New Westminster, B. C., and Tacoma and Seattle in Washington the holdover members.

The league's officials are meeting here today.

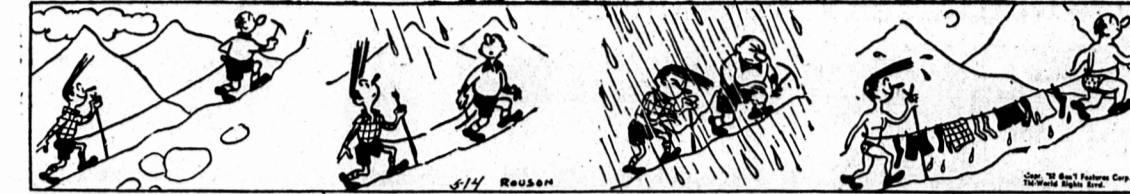

Softball players, most of whom were in their early or middle teens during the war, may be interested to know that a meeting is being held in Amherst on Sunday May 23 for the purpose of forming a Maritime Softball Association. Yesterday we received a letter from C. MacDonald, Halifax, advising us about the meeting. Mr. MacDonald is secretary of the M. S. A. and anyone who wishes to correspond with him about softball matters or a softball association should address his letter in care of Box 642, Halifax.

In his letter Mr. MacDonald asks if there is much softball being played on the Island and if there are any leagues in Charlottetown. Last year most of the softball that we heard of was played in Summerside. For the past several seasons a team from Holmans has been winning the Island title by defeating squads from the Summerside Air Station and usually a team from Charlottetown.

Two years ago the Basilia Youth Club and the Liguorian Youth Club formed their own softball leagues with the L. Y. C. All-Stars unofficially winning the City title. This team lost out to Summerside in a series for the Island crown. At the same time that summer there was a team in Parkdale and another at the Experimental Farm. Last year the Parkdale boys were the only ones in the City and vicinity to continue playing softball.

This year, it is understood that the B. Y. C. plan to go back into softball. They have the equipment and the use of the Knights of Columbus diamond. Last night we were talking to Bruce MacLaren, Carealist at the Experimental Farm and an ardent softball supporter but Bruce could not give any definite word about the possibilities of the Farm having a team. This will probably depend upon the ability of the students whom they employ for the summer. The L. Y. C. and although we haven't heard of it, surmise that Norman Larzer will be rounding up a team out in Parkdale.

As of now this seems to be the outlook for softball in the City. A number of fellows who do not wish to play baseball and sort of anxious to form some sort of City League. The game was popular here during the war and fans were treated to some high class ball at that time. Another point in its favor is that a team can be organized with a minimum of expenses.

The lighting system to be installed at Memorial Field this summer will be the same as that used at Houston, Maine, George Francis, president of the Abegweit Athletic Association told us the other night. Eight poles, each 65 feet high will carry the lights. Two of these poles will be placed behind first and third base, two more behind home plate and four in the outfield. In all 180,000 watts will be used to light up the field. If a ball should hit one of the bulbs the bulb won't break as it will have a face of unbreakable glass. A total of 120 bulbs will be used. The poles behind first and third will carry 24 bulbs each. There will be 24 floods behind home plate and 48 in the outfield.

Eight teams have signified their intentions of entering the Island five-pin bowling championships which are to be held at the Rollaway Alleys on May 24, it was learned last night. Four of these teams are from Prince George County, three from Charlottetown and one from St. Peter's Bay. Curran and Briggs, Capital Alleys, the R.C.A.F. and Mikouche are the entrants from the western part of the Island. The All Stars, Island defending champions, the Rockets and M. C. A. will compete from the City. It is also possible that Maritime Electric may enter a team.

"Hub" Beaudry, the Islanders penalty killing ace of the past two winters, is battling it out for third base position with the Garson Greyhounds in a Northern Ontario ball league. The Greyhounds were district champions last year and have already been practicing for nearly three weeks.

"Red" Graham, Harry Poulton Sign For Bout At Local Forum May 24

Hard punching "Red" Graham of Halifax and Charlottetown's clever Harry Poulton have been signed for a ten round bout at the Forum on May 24, it was announced last night by Forum manager Bill Brown.

Graham came to terms with Brown yesterday for the holiday fight which will usher in what promises to be a busy season for Maritime pugilists.

Negotiations between Brown and Graham had been broken off several times previously when the two could not come to terms. Graham, who fights under manager Bob Talbot has been rated fairly highly and wanted a good price.

The winner of the fight will get a crack at Tommy Spencer's Maritime welterweight crown. This fight will probably be held in Charlottetown around the middle of June.

Graham comes here with a reputation of being a solid southpaw puncher. He fought Poulton on two occasions several seasons ago and both times he floored Harry in the first round but not for the full count.

Poulton has been holding daily workouts at Aubrey Found's gymnasium and is nearing peak condition. In addition to performing rope skipping and punching exercise he has been boxing with Austin Squarebriggs and "Bud" Lund.

Harry, who enjoyed a good season last summer, figures that this may be his best year. Now in his middle twenties Poulton should be at or near the peak of his career.

In addition to the Poulton-Graham scrap Bill Brown is busy lining up three other fights. One will be a six round semi-final and the others four round prelims. The participants in these fights will be announced shortly.

To Consider 7th Team In N.H.L.

TORONTO, May 13 (CP) — Hockey moguls from the six National Hockey League cities are due here tonight and the question before them is whether they should make the world's leading circuit a big seven. That conundrum will be answered tomorrow.

The man on the spot will be James C. Henry of Cleveland Barons who will attempt to convince the N.H.L. governors that Cleveland is willing and able to step from the American Hockey League into the big time.

The affable Henry has a big selling job. The vote must be unanimous, meaning he must convince officials from Toronto, Montreal, Detroit, New York, Boston and Chicago that Cleveland is big league.

The Cleveland plan is up to big-league standards and, among other things, his players are capable of holding their own in the big time.

Sub Fleet And Blue Man Favored For Preakness

BALTIMORE, May 13 (AP) — Sub Fleet and Blue Man were tabbed the hot horses for Saturday's Preakness around the cold and windy Pimlico barns today.

Trainers and stablehands figured the second and third Kentucky Derby colts will be the two to beat in the 1.3-16-mile race for a gross pot of more than \$100,000.

White Oak Stable's Blue Man warmed up the stable conversation by reeling off three-quarters of a mile in 1:12 3/5.

The stable handicappers figure Blue Man, winner of the Flamingo Stakes and Experimental No. 2, showed a lot by finishing third in the Derby even though he was eight lengths back of the runner-up, Sub Fleet.

Blue Man lurched sideways against the starting gate and got off last in the Derby field of 16. At three-quarters of a mile the son of Blue Woods still was only 12th and trainer Woody Stephens said as he came up to third at the finish "he still wanted to run."

Trainer Jack Hodgins reported Sub Fleet is in good shape. The son of Count Fleet just galloped this morning. He worked in the mud Monday, going five-eighths of a mile in 1:02 4/5.

Freak Baseball Game Accident

DENISON, Ia., May 13 (AP) — A freak baseball game accident caused the death today of Don Lee Johannsen, 14.

The lad was one of a group playing baseball last Sunday on a Denison sandlot. He was pitching. A teammate hit the ball, the bat broke, and part of the bat flew out, striking Don on the temple.

Apparently not seriously hurt, the boy was taken to a hospital for observation. He seemed to be recovering but lapsed into unconsciousness today and died of a cerebral hemorrhage.

Stan Musial Appears Settled At First Base

BROOKLYN, May 13 (AP) — It looks like Stan Musial has come to first base to stay.

Manager Eddie Stanky of St. Louis Cardinals won't make it that definite but today he sent ailing Steve Bilko, his only other first sacker back to the minors.

"Musial is my first baseman," said Stanky, "maybe for today. Maybe for two weeks. Maybe for five months."

Stan took over when Bilko was injured May 7.

"I don't mind playing first," said Musial who first moved from the outfield to the infield in 1946.

"I get used to it. The toughest play you have to make is that overhand toss to the pitcher, who is covering the bag. That doesn't bother me anymore."

"How about his hitting? Would the steady grind of infield play drain important points off his batting average?"

"I don't know," he said "it might effect you a little late in the season. You might tire easier but I don't think it will have too much to do with it."

Musial, highest salaried player in the league with an \$85,000 pay cheque, isn't concerned with his slow start at bat.

"Maybe I left it at St. Petersburg," he said, referring to his scuffling pace in spring training. "Gee, I hate to hit down there because it costs you points later on."

"But I am up close to 300 (actually .311 after today's game). I think I'll be getting up there pretty soon."

Louis Celebrates 38th Birthday

CHICAGO, May 13 (AP) — Joe Louis today celebrated his 38th birthday, a tall, heavy-set insurance man with a good golf game and a typical dad's fondness for his two youngsters.

Baldish and admitting to 230 pounds, the former world heavyweight champion snapped a quick "no" when asked if the urge still isn't there to try his once devastating fists again in the ring.
